EXPLANATORY NOTES.

A. An attempt has been made—partly by advertising in *The Times*, *Sunderland Daily Echo*, *Newcastle Daily Chronicle*, *Newcastle Evening Chronicle*, *Newcastle Daily Journal*, *North Mail*, and *Evening Mail*; partly by personal inquiries directed to Boys, Old Boys, Parents, and various other people—to procure information as to the (1) Name, (2) Rank, (3) Regiment, Ship, or other Section of the Army or Navy, and (4) Present Station, of EVERY OLD BOY now on military or naval service.

Also, information has been sought with regard to EVERY OLD BOY who, while serving in the War, has (1) Fallen, or (2) Become one of the Missing, or (3) Been Wounded, or (4) Been Taken Prisoner, or (5) Gained Special Distinction.

The particulars obtained have been in some cases full and exact; in others, copious but obscure or contradictory; in others, again, extremely scanty—perhaps a name, and nothing more. And there is good reason for believing that there are hundreds of Old Bedan soldiers and sailors whose bare names, even, have not been supplied.

B. The Roll here given is based upon the materials at present available. It is obviously incomplete, and is perhaps incorrect in several places. But, having been compiled with some amount of care in an honest endeavour to represent the facts as far as they are known, it is more likely to be unsatisfactory on account of omissions than by reason of important mistakes.

The Roll at present contains the Names of 515 Old Bedans (including several who left School to enlist), of whom 470 are in the Army and 45 in the Navy.

An Analysis based on RANK gives the following figures:

[At the foot of the Roll appear the Names of 5 of the Masters at Bede School who are in the Army. Not being Old Boys of the School, they are not included in the foregoing Analysis. Also, the Names of 7 Masters and of the Clerk at Bede School, who Attested under Lord Derby's Scheme, are shown at the foot of the Roll.]

Another Analysis of the 515 Old Bedan Soldiers and Sailors in the Roll gives their PLACE OF STATION as follows:—

British Isles, 262; British Overseas Dominions (chiefly India and Egypt), 24; At Sea, 41; Salonika and Mesopotamia, 27; France and Flanders, 161. Of the men shown as being in the British Isles, not a few are probably already abroad, and many others are certain to go abroad before long.

A Third Analysis of the Roll indicates the following facts with regard to Old Boys:—

Killed in action, 19; Died while on Active Service, 2; Missing (for eleven months), 3; Wounded or Gassed, 30; Prisoners in Germany, 4 (one Wounded).

Decorations: Military Cross, 1; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 1; Cross of Chevalier of Legion of Honour, 1. Mentioned in Despatches, 3.

c. The figures placed after each Old Boy's Name in the Roll show the year of his leaving the School.

d. The Roll will be augmented and amended from time to time as additional information is received, and will be published afresh in each Number of *The Bedan* which appears during the War. My colleague, Mr. T. H. Blyth, has assisted me to compile this and past Drafts. Other colleagues will help with future Drafts. With a view to making the Roll as comprehensive, as up-to-date, and as well-arranged as possible, we shall at all times be glad to receive particulars or suggestions from any quarter. Enlistments, promotions, changes in place of station, and the addition or the alteration of other items, daily combine to render the Roll somewhat kaleidoscopic: it varies in appearance almost incessantly, and is always attractive. To record each new piece of information is to us a labour of love: all that we ask is that anybody who notices anything erroneous or out-of-date in the Roll, or anything omitted which ought certainly to appear, will kindly write to us about the matter.

I specially appeal for Names and Particulars of Old Bedans now serving who were at the School fifteen, twenty, or twenty-five years ago. In many cases it is hard or impossible (mainly owing to changes of address) for me to trace nineteenth-century Old Boys. I therefore beg them, or their relatives or acquaintances, to favour me from time to time with a post-card giving such information as the Roll may embody.

The whole SCHOOL is most grateful to Old Boys who have supported, or who are now supporting in arms the cause of King and Country, and also to their parents and friends. We are wishful and eager, as has already been indicated, to have a *full* list of those Old Boys' names. We shall watch, with pride, interest, sympathy, and affection, the careers of *all* Old Bedans taking part in the War; and we shall ever remember with special gratitude the men who fall. We hope and pray that, by making the supreme sacrifice, they may gain an even better reward than grateful remembrance. "Whosoever shall lose his life shall preserve it"; and an Old Bedan who dies in battle for the right may perhaps realise the full significance of his school motto *Pest Tenebras Lux: After Darkness, Light.*

- Craven, M.B., B.S. (Durham), Captain Jos. Wilfrid. 1st Northumbrian Field Amb., R.A.M.C. Awarded, by French Republic, Cross of Chevalier of Legion of Honour, Nov. 6, '15. Mentioned in Sir John French's Despatch, Nov. 30, '15.
- On Nov. 6th the following official announcement was made: "Captain Craven has to-day been decorated by the French Republic with the Cross of a Chevalier of the Legion of Honour for exceptional resource, courage and good work when in charge of ambulance convoy working between Ypres and St. Jean, Potyze and Menin Road, from April 27th to May 6th, and from May 12th to June 20th. Also exceptional ability in leading and directing bearers in collection of wounded in Sanctuary Wood and Hooge district during latter period." The decoration won by Dr. Craven (who was at the school from 1900 to 1905) is a beautiful cross of blue and white enamel bearing the inscription:—*Republique Francaise, 1870. Legion d'Honneur. Honneur et Patrie.*

- The details of the award are thus given in a special supplement to the "London Gazette":—A/24174 Pte. J. H. Lindsay, 5th Canadian Infantry Battalion.—For conspicuous gallantry and good work between Dec. 12th and 14th, 1915, in scouting and reconnoitring previous to the attack on the German advanced barricade at Messines road. He was often under heavy fire at close range. Finally he did excellent work in the capture of the barricade.

One man was wounded and the party scattered, but Lieutenant Neill remained with the wounded man, bandaged him, and finally got him safely to the dressing station, although on the way he and two men who were assisting him were knocked down by a shell.

THE NEW CHAIRMAN.

Alderman A. Gibson, J.P., has been appointed Chairman of the Governors of the Bede Collegiate Schools. He is one of the oldest members of the Corporation of Sunderland, having been elected a Councillor in 1878. He was made an Alderman in 1894, and has been a Borough Magistrate for many years.

Everybody in any way associated with the Schools heartily wishes Ald. Gibson a long, happy, and successful tenure of his new office.

MR. AUCHMUTY.

Mr. Kenneth Charles Auchmuty, M.A. (Lond.), Senior French Master at Bede School since 1905, leaves at Easter to become French Master at Bedford Modern School. Before coming to Bede School he was for three years at Louth Grammar School—most of the time as Senior Assistant Master, and had had other scholastic experience. His father, the Rev. A. C. Auchmuty, formerly of Lincoln College, Oxford, was for some years Headmaster of Lucton Grammar School.

Mr. Auchmuty, who lived abroad from 1898 to 1900, has capital credentials as a French Master, and has edited some French Texts.

For several years he has acted as Editor of

The Bedan. He originated the Annual General Knowledge Examination, held at the School just before the Christmas Holidays, and was mainly responsible for the highly entertaining Papers set (which were printed in the Magazine).

The Headmaster, the Staff, and the Boys of Bede School, all wish him much success in his new sphere.

BEDS DEBATING SOCIETY: CUP DEBATE.

Dryden's "Absalom and Achitophel," written in 1681, is the finest political satire in the whole range of English poetry, and contains many lines which have become household words. The famous couplet "Great wits are sure to madness near allied, And thin partitions do their bounds divide," used originally in a scornful analysis of the character of the first Earl of Shaftesbury, has given rise to innumerable discussions. Last night it was the subject dealt with at the 279th meeting of the Bede School Debating Society, when the 15th half-yearly contest for the Airy Challenge Cup took place. Mr W. V. Hornsby presided, and there was a capital attendance. The competitors were Messrs J. Border, M. Share, A. Cairns, M. Lipton, R. Mincovitch, and C Sanderson. The first four spoke so well that it was hard to say who did best, ideas, connected argument, illustrations, voice, language, delivery, and effectiveness all being considered. Mr Border received the award. For the Officers' Prize, given by Mrs Ferguson, Messrs L. Smith, Hornsby, and A. W. Best, competed, and Mr Smith was a third time successful. Messrs Witter and Engvall spoke as non-competitors. The House by a very large majority agreed with Dryden's dictum—though one speaker pointed out with truth and force that "madness" in any shape or form, has never been attributed to Shakespeare, the greatest mind which England has produced. The Headmaster adjudicated, and, in acknowledging a vote of thanks to himself and to Mrs Ferguson, who presented the Cup and the prize to the winners, congratulated the society on its usefulness and remarkable vitality. One boy had gone so far as to say that the society was "one of the few things which neither the war nor the weather had been able to suppress."

BEDS SCHOOL CONCERT.

Under the auspices of the Bede Collegiate School Debating Society a concert (one of several school functions arranged for the end of the Christmas term but abandoned then owing to the death of Coun. Johnson, the respected chairman of the Governors), was held early on Saturday

evening in the school gymnasium, Park Hall, Mr. R. F. Jarman, Mus. Bac., F.R.C.O., being responsible for the programme. There was a large audience, including boys, parents, friends and masters. Miss C. Humble, who has a finely-trained voice of power and beauty, sang "They call me Mimi", and "Mimi's Farewell" (from Puccini's "La Bohème"), and Elizabeth's Greeting ("Tannhäuser"). The School Orchestra played with credit Van Dyck's Norwegian Waltz and "Melodie d'Amour," Elgar's "Pomp and Circumstance" Marches, Mozart's Minuet and Trio, and selections from Wagner's "Tannhäuser." On the piano Liszt's Hungarian Rhapsody, Beethoven's Sonata Pathétique, and Heller's Allegro were well rendered by C. Porteus, L. Graddon, and J. H. Jarman respectively. With great acceptance Mr. C. K. Witter gave, as flute solos, Hodson's "Tell Me, Mary," and a Tyrolean Air by Rossini. This year being the Tercentenary of Shakspere's death, a choir of boys discoursed some of his songs. In particular, three separate settings (by Pelham Humphrey, Arne, and Sullivan) of "Where the Bee Sucks" were heard with interest and appreciation. A hearty vote of thanks was given to Mr. Jarman and the performers at the instance of the Headmaster (Mr. Ferguson), who, remarking that many Old Boys once members of the orchestra were now on military service, appealed for fresh members. The general singing of "Rule, Britannia" and the National Anthem concluded an enjoyable and highly successful concert.

ARTS AND CRAFTS SOCIETY'S CONCERT.

Postponed last Christmas on account of the death of Councillor Johnson, the annual concert of the Bede School Arts and Crafts Society took place at the school last Thursday evening. The art room was crowded to its utmost capacity, and the audience, which included Mr. Ferguson and several of the assistant masters, very thoroughly appreciated the excellent entertainment provided.

After a spirited rendering by the school orchestra of the ever-popular "Poet and Peasant" overture, A. Cairns gave a humorous imitation of a German at the telephone, C. F. Porteus played gracefully one of Chopin's best-known waltzes, F. Harrison won a deserved encore for his clever recitation, and A. Eagle sang one of his inimitable comic songs, relating to the delight of his hearers how "they all went marching in." There followed a selection from "The Bohemian Girl," a "War Caricature Competition," being a series of lightning sketches of prominent persons, German and otherwise, which caused the greatest amusement, and a selection of popular melodies played on the tin whistle by G. Huntley, with refrains by the audience. A waltz specially composed by Mr. C. C. Bell for the occasion, in

the performance of which the orchestra surpassed itself, served as an introduction to "Fair Rosie," a novel and amusing farce by J. W. Engvall, last term's Senior Prefect. Capitably played by Messrs. Lipton, Mincovitch, Harrison, Cairns, and Witter, this achieved an immediate and gratifying success and brought to a brilliant conclusion a programme upon which the organisers, Mr. J. W. Hawkins and Mr. Witter, were heartily congratulated. The entertainment was repeated on Friday afternoon for the benefit of the junior school.

EXAMINATION ENTRY FORMS.

This year the Entry Forms and Fees for the London Matriculation June Examination are to be sent in before May 1st, and those for the Oxford Local Senior and Junior July Examinations before May 9th. As these dates come during the Easter Vacation, the work connected with the Forms and Fees has had to be done *this* Term. Similar work, in a year when Easter falls early, can conveniently be deferred until the beginning of the Summer Term.

THE WEATHER.

The incessant winds and rains in February and March sorely tried the temporary building (better known, perhaps, as "the tin tabernacle"), a place not excessively weather-proof even in ordinary showers. On one particularly tempestuous morning the weather-cock on the top of the main school swayed as though it would fall. Since then, however, it has been examined and found to be quite strong and stable. We may mention that a scientific gentleman, who for many years has passed Bede School frequently, told us lately that, as far as his observation goes, the weather-cock referred to is more sensitive and trustworthy as an indicator of the direction of the wind than any other in Sunderland.

We offer sympathy to Mr E. M. Maccoby, whose father died recently.

The School's 26th birthday will fall during the Easter holidays—April 28th, 1916.

Next Term, which begins on May 10th, is likely to see the School more crowded than ever.

We purpose to observe the Tercentenary of Shakespeare's Death. But the ceremony will necessarily be somewhat belated.

We congratulate Joseph Porteus on winning an Open Mathematical Exhibition of £60 a year for three years, tenable at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. As he had previously passed the Junior and Senior Oxford "Locals" with first class honours and the London Matriculation Examination in the first division, his course at the school has been brilliant.

Porteus has now joined the King's Royal Rifles. Rupert Lee, who went to Oxford in October as a scholar of Jesus College, is a private in the Artists' Rifles. J. H. White, who, but for the war, would have gone to Emmanuel College, Cambridge, in October, as an Exhibitioner, is a Sec.-Lieut. in the 3rd South Staffordshire Regiment.

The Rev. Alfred Hooper, B.A., was, at the beginning of this Term, appointed a member of the Staff, and is doing good work in the school. He took an honours degree at Durham University, was an Exhibitioner of Hatfield Hall, and has had three years' scholastic experience.

The Headmaster has had the pleasure of receiving scores of letters from Old Boys at the front. The contents of some of these epistles—especially of those which, having been sent by men home on leave, were not "censored"—would make capital "copy" for the Magazine. On the whole, however, it is perhaps better not to publish anything which could possibly be considered as war news.

BEDE BOYS' SCHOOL.

CERTIFICATES PRESENTED.

HEADMASTER'S YEARLY REPORT.

At a private and informal gathering of the whole of the Bede Collegiate Boys' School, held yesterday in the school gymnasium (Park Hall), the Headmaster, Mr. Ferguson, stated that the Governors had, for various reasons connected with the war, decided not to hold this winter the usual annual public speech day in the Victoria Hall, and not to give Form prizes and Subject prizes for the school year from August 1st, 1914, to July 31st, 1915, but to award certificates to boys who in ordinary circumstances would have been prize-winners. He then presented the certificates, the lettering and arrangement of which had been designed by Mr J. W. Hawkins, Art Master. They bore the school arms, were appropriately worded, and, though simple, were most pleasing in general effect, the balance of matter and of colour being highly satisfactory.

Reviewing the school's work and progress during the year, the Headmaster said that, in the main, things had gone on very well, in spite of

some unavoidable drawbacks. The premises were occupied for a short time by soldiers. Five masters went on military service, and delay in filling their places could not be helped. But the number of pupils rose steadily, and was 375 at midsummer. Though several big boys had enlisted straight from school, and though the Sixth Form was unusually small, the total number of boys this week was 402, a "record" figure. Some of the classrooms were crowded.

The principal recent examination successes of the boys were the following:—

Exhibition, £30 a year for three years, Emmanuel College, Cambridge, and first class in Cambridge "Previous," November, 1914, John Henry White, now second-lieutenant, 3rd South Staffordshire Regiment.

Open Music Scholarship, £60 a year for three years, Jesus College, Oxford, June, 1915, F. Rupert M. Lee, now private, Artists' Rifles, London.

Open Mathematical Exhibition, £60 a year for three years, Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, December, 1915, Joseph Porteus.

London Matriculation, 1915: Jan., 1; June, 6. Oxford Local Senior, 1915: Honours, 9; pass, 7; distinctions, 2; Oral French, 4.

Oxford Local Junior, 1915: Honours, 19; pass, 17; distinctions, 8; Oral French, 8; Oral German, 5. The results in the Junior Examination were brilliant.

The various school games, clubs and societies continue to flourish. Last season's football team did very well: Matches played, 9; won, 6; drawn, 2; lost, 1; goals for, 24; goals against, 7. This season the school has won four matches out of five played. W. G. Jackson, the goalkeeper, is a tower of strength. The cricket eleven of 1915 played only three school matches, but won them all. In the matter of swimming the school is maintaining its splendid tradition. Since July, 1914, the boys have gained 175 swimming certificates, medals, etc. The seven boys who qualified for the School Silver Medal for Life-Saving each swam, with their clothes on, 20 lengths of the High Street Bath. School champion, F. H. MacKay; junior champion, M. Brown, 1914; J. Race, 1915. Boxing Club officers: MacKay, Haswell, Huntly. Nearly all the past officers of the club figure in the School Roll of Honour. Visits to the Daddry Shield "Camp" continue to be popular.

The Debating Society is as vigorous and useful as ever. The younger members take an active share in its proceedings; president, L. Smith. Holder of Airy Challenge Cup, Forbes; freshers' prize, Hindmarch; secretary, Hornsby. Engvall and Finney have spoken frequently and well. The school orchestra, though greatly depleted by the war, practises steadily. One or two boys learning to play the 'cello would get help and

encouragement. The school library attracts an ever increasing number of readers.

The Arts and Crafts Society has had many enjoyable and instructive meetings and two exhibitions. Sec., N. Cooke. "The Bedan," the school magazine, keeps up to a high standard. Mr K. C. Achmuty is editor, but most of the contributors are boys. Engvall, the senior prefect, has supplied some capital material. The lecture on Russia and Poland, which Mr Rothay Reynolds gave in the school a few months ago, was highly appreciated.

During the past year Mr G. R. Goldsbrough, an Old Bedan, took the D.Sc. degree of Durham University.

The recent death of Councillor J. W. Johnson, Chairman of the Governors, was a grievous loss to the school, which will never forget his kindness, his firm friendship and encouragement, and his invaluable services.

The Roll of Honour of Old Bedans in his Majesty's Forces was referred to at some length.

The Headmaster expressed the sympathy of the school with the friends of Old Boys who have fallen in the war, and also with Mr Hogben, the senior classical master, whose son, Lieut. H. Hogben, was killed near Bagdad; and the kind thoughts and good wishes of the school for all Old Bedan soldiers and sailors. After the certificates had been presented, cheers were given for the school, the headmaster, the staff, and the governors, and then the National Anthem was sung.

In addition, a junior team played a match with Mr Widdows' school, which was lost, the score being 5-2.

Two very enjoyable home matches have been played against the 4th Batt. of the Sherwood Foresters. The School XI, however, rather gained than lost credit by their display in these two matches. Against men much older and heavier than themselves they fully held their own, though many critics, judging from the scores, would hardly credit this statement. We hope to give them another game on April 15th, when we shall have the assistance of four Old Bedans.

There is one more ordinary school match to be played, namely, the return fixture with West Hartlepool Secondary School.

The school defence has been somewhat weakened by the accident which Richardson unfortunately met with during the match with Rutherford College. The emergency was met by shifting Hornsby from centre-half to full-back, and bringing Ayre from the forward line to fill the place at centre-half. Ayre's place in the forward line has been filled by the inclusion of Durrant. Another loss has been that of Potts, the outside right, whose place for the last match of the season will be rather difficult to fill.

The team work well together on the whole, though the half-back line often does not follow up the forwards when attacking. The strongest part of the team, despite the loss of Richardson, is the defence, Jackson having repeatedly saved almost certain goals by the exercise of much judgment and skill.

The goals have been scored by: Walker, 10; Burnand, 8; Ayre, 5; Haswell and Smith, 2 each; and Blair, 1. Also, Burnand and Potts scored 1 each against Whitley Bay; Haswell, Walker, and Potts 1 each against the Sherwood Foresters.

HARTLEPOOL HENRY SMITH SCHOOL. Away. This match was played in unsettled weather, the ground being in a slippery condition. A keen game resulted, neither side being able to pierce their opponents' defence till a few minutes from the end, when Walker scored two goals for Bede. Result: Bede 2, Henry Smith School 0.

GATESHEAD SECONDARY SCHOOL. Home. This match was played in fine but windy weather. A very even game resulted, but Bede gained the victory by the only goal scored, Burnand being responsible for this success. Result: Bede 1, Gateshead 0.

RUTHERFORD COLLEGE. Away. Played at Newcastle in very windy weather, the ground however being in good condition. A vigorous game resulted in a win for Bede, Ayre and Walker scoring for the school. Rutherford only managed to pierce the school defence once. Result: Bede 2, Rutherford College 1.

GATESHEAD SECONDARY SCHOOL. Away. This match was played in wet weather, on a very

slippery ground. Both custodians were busy, the issue not being decided till near the end of the second half, when two goals were scored for the school by Burnand and Walker. Result: Bede 1, Gateshead 0.

RYHOPE SECONDARY SCHOOL. Away. Once again windy weather prevailed for this interesting annual event. A ding dong struggle ensued, and both goals were hotly assailed. In the second half Bede were slightly the smarter team, but could not press home their advantage. The forwards especially distinguished themselves, but reference must also be made to Jackson's excellent display in goal. Result: Bede 0, Ryhope 0.

Much enthusiasm has been shown in the District Competition. The final arrangement of the teams is by no means obvious, though Roker are easily champions, while Hendon undoubtedly gain the wooden spoon. ARTS AND CRAFTS SOCIETY.
