The NAMES of all OLD BOYS of BEDE SCHOOL (1890-1916)

Who were in any Branch of His Majesty's Military or Naval Forces
During the GREAT WAR which began in 1914.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

A. An attempt has been made—partly by advertising in *The Times*, *Sunderland Daily Echo*, *Newcastle Daily Chronicle*, *Newcastle Evening Chronicle*, *Newcastle Daily Journal*, *North Mail*, and *Evening Mail*; partly by personal inquiries directed to Boys, Old Boys, Parents, and various other people—to procure information as to the (1) Name, (2) Rank, (3) Regiment, Ship, or other Section of the Army or Navy, and (4) Present Station, of EVERY OLD BOY now on military or naval service.

Also, information has been sought with regard to EVERY OLD BOY who, while serving in the War, has (1) Fallen, or (2) Become one of the Missing, or (3) Been Wounded, or (4) Been Taken Prisoner, or (5) Gained Special Distinction.

The particulars obtained have been in some cases full and exact; in others, copious but obscure or contradictory; in others, again, extremely scanty—perhaps a name, and nothing more. And there is good reason for believing that there are hundreds of Old Bedan soldiers and sailors whose bare names, even, have not been supplied.

B. The Roll here given is based upon the materials at present available. It is obviously incomplete, and is perhaps incorrect in several places. But, having been compiled with some amount of care in an honest endeavour to represent the facts as far as they are known, it is more likely to be unsatisfactory on account of omissions than by reason of important mistakes.

The Roll at present contains the Names of 627 Old Bedans (including several who left School to enlist), of whom 578 are in the Army and 49 in the Navy.

An Analysis based on RANK gives the following figures:

- b. NAVY: 27 Officers (4 Lieutenants, 1 Navigating Lieutenant, 3 Eng.-Lieuts., 1 Lieut.-
Gunner, 1 Navig. Officer, 2 Naval Instrs., 8 Sub-Lieuts., 5 Eng.-Sub-Lieuts.,
1 Gunnery Sub-Lieut., 1 Sec.-Engineer).
- 22 Men (1 Warrant Eng., 1 Chief E.R.A., 11 E.R. Artificers, 1 Signalman,
1 Gunner, 1 Wireless Operator, 2 Writers, 1 Able Seaman, 1 Ordinary
Seaman, 1 Man in Armourer's Crew, 1 Cook's Mate).

[At the foot of the Roll appear the Names of 7 Bede School Masters (1 Killed in action) belonging to the Army. Not being Old Boys of the School, they are not included in the foregoing Analysis; but the Clerk, an Old Boy serving, is so included. Also, the Names of 5 Masters who Attested under Lord Derby's Scheme, are shown at the foot of the Roll.]

— Another Analysis of the 627 Old Bedan Soldiers and Sailors in the Roll gives their PLACE of STATION as follows:—

British Isles, 225 (including Wounded and Invalided); British Overseas Dominions (chiefly India and Egypt), 22; At Sea, 49; Salouika and Mesopotamia, 13; Germany, 6; France and Flanders, 312. Of the men shown as being in the British Isles, not a few are probably already abroad, and many others are certain to go abroad before long.

A Third Analysis of the Roll indicates the following facts with regard to Old Boys:—

Killed in action, 39; Died while on Active Service, 2; Missing, 1; Wounded, Gassed, or Shell-Shocked, 79; Prisoners of War, in Germany, 6 (2 Wounded).

Decorations, 8: Military Cross, 4; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 1; Military Medal, 2; Cross of Chevalier of Legion of Honour, 1. Mentioned in Despatches, 3.

c. The figures placed after each Old Boy's Name in the Roll show the year of his leaving the School.

d. The GROWTH of the Roll has been steady. Here are the Dates when the different Drafts were printed, and the Number of Names in each Draft:—1st, Dec., '14, 180; 2nd, March, '15, 240; 3rd, July, '15, 320; 4th, Dec., '15, 440; 5th, April, '16, 515; 6th, July, '16, 570; 7th, Dec., '16, 627.

e. The Roll will be augmented and amended from time to time as additional information is received, and will be published afresh in each Number of *The Bedan* which appears during the War. My colleague Mr. (now Gun.) T. H. Blyth assisted me to compile the earlier Drafts. Mr. J. H. Smith-white has helped with the last two. With a view to making the Roll as comprehensive, as up-to-date, and as well-arranged as possible, we shall at all times be glad to receive particulars or suggestions from any quarter. Enlistments, promotions, changes in place of station, and the addition or the alteration of other items, daily combine to render the Roll somewhat kaleidoscopic: it varies in appearance almost incessantly, and is always attractive. To record each new piece of information is to us a labour of love: all that we ask is that anybody who notices anything erroneous or out-of-date in the Roll, or anything omitted which ought certainly to appear, will kindly write to us about the matter.

I specially appeal for Names and Particulars of Old Bedans now serving who were at the School fifteen, twenty, or twenty-five years ago. In many cases it is hard or impossible (mainly owing to changes of address) for me to trace nineteenth-century Old Boys. I therefore beg them, or their relatives or acquaintances, to favour me from time to time with a post-card giving such information as can be embodied in the Roll.

The whole SCHOOL is most grateful to Old Boys who have supported, or who are now supporting in arms the cause of King and Country, and also to their parents and friends. We are wishful and eager, as has already been indicated, to have a full list of those Old Boys' names. We shall watch, with pride, interest, sympathy, and affection, the careers of all Old Bedans taking part in the War; and we shall ever remember with special gratitude the men who fall. We hope and pray that, by making the supreme sacrifice, they may gain an even better reward than grateful remembrance. "Whosoever shall lose his life shall preserve it" (Luke xvii, 33); and an Old Bedan who dies in battle for the right may perhaps realise the full significance of his school motto *Post Tenebras Lux: After Darkness. Light.*

 "For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led two sections of bombers by day over the open into the enemy's trench, in which the sentries were plainly visible. After a successful bomb attack he built a barrier fifty yards beyond the objective."

Bede School Debating Society.

300th MEETING.

Last night the half-yearly competition for the Airy Challenge Cup took place, the candidates being Messrs R. Keenlyside, D. A. S. Cairns, C. F. Porteus, N. Cooke, and J. Hindmarch, every one of whom spoke well. The motion, carried by 39 votes against 11, was that the House agreed with Dr. Johnson's dictum, added to Goldsmith's "Traveller" in the form of a note:—

How small, of all that human hearts endure,
That part that laws or kings can cause or cure!

The discussion, in which Messrs Lipton (president), Share, Border, Maccoby, Mincovitch, and Bell took part as non-competitors, was most interesting, the last-named speaker showing with exceptional clearness to what a large extent a man's personal unhappiness depends upon himself, and is not the result of authority imposed from outside.

Mr. Keenlyside was awarded the cup for a speech, excellent both in matter and form, and delivered with grace and fine effect. It will be reported in full in the next issue of "The Bedan."

The Headmaster, when adjudicating, said the society was founded in October, 1905, and had regularly ever since held about thirty meetings a year. According to his observation, most debating societies were very transitory things. They rose, flourished, decayed, and died—all within a comparatively short period. He attributed the long, vigorous life of that particular society to three main causes: good management, wise choice of subjects for debate, and proved usefulness. All the officers but one were boys, and, though many masters had lent a helping hand, the capi-

tal work done by Mr. Airy and Captain Joseph in the past, and by Mr. Witter at present, deserved special acknowledgment. The motions discussed had generally related to matters which were live and topical. Some of the debates had attracted no little attention, being noticed in London and Scottish newspapers. The value of membership had often shown itself, boys prominent in the society having been amongst the most successful in the school.

Messrs L. Smith and J. W. Engvall had attended more meetings than anybody except Captain Joseph.

Grateful allusion was made to hundreds of old members who have served with the Colours, and it was stated that, of past officers of the society, at least four (Captain G. Haswell, Lieut. T. W. Hetherington, Lance-Corporal T. B. Bubb, and Pte. C. L. Pattison) have been killed in action, and at least five (Lieut. C. W. Pollock, Second-Lieuts. H. E. Sladden, J. M. Herring, and F. Wayman, and Pte. G. S. Phalp) have been wounded.

In the absence of Mrs. Ferguson, owing to illness, her niece, Miss Mary Ryder Smith, presented the cup to the winner, and was accorded a vote of thanks.

THE CUP-WINNER'S SPEECH.

[Keenlyside is 14 years old. His speech is reported *verbatim*—except that one sentence and four words have been altered.]

Mr. President.—The subject for debate to-night seems to me to be a very difficult one for boys like ourselves to air their opinions upon. What do we know about the burdens of the human heart? Why, we have scarcely begun to live yet! I think these lines would form an admirable text for a learned divine to preach upon. Long years of experience are absolutely necessary for one to understand the full significance of the quotation,

"How small, of all that human hearts endure,
That part that laws or kings can cause or cure!"

These lines may be found in Oliver Goldsmith's "Traveller"; but, curiously enough, they were not written by Goldsmith himself. The latter sent his poem to his distinguished friend, Dr. Johnson, for revision. And he it was who, according to Boswell, added nine lines, two of which form our subject for debate.

If this couplet applied in the days of Johnson and Goldsmith, it certainly applies to-day; for at that time, the bulk of the people did not enjoy the privileges which they now possess. Wages were very low, and things which we now consider to be necessities could only be obtained by the rich. Goldsmith, in his "Deserted Village", makes mention of a clergyman as "passing rich with forty pounds a-year". What a wage for an educated man!

Undoubtedly, laws have some influence in increasing or decreasing the sum of human happiness. According to our friends the Socialists, most of the miseries of the human race are the fault of laws and kings. In the past, certainly, kings often ruled tyrannically, and the laws were made for the rich by the rich. The people were oppressed, and consequently much trouble must have arisen. To-day, things are very different. We seem to be drawing nearer the "millennium". Of late years, many laws have been passed for bettering the condition of the poorer classes. For example, Old Age Pensions, Insurance and Compensation Acts, Factory Acts, and Free Education, by which every child in the kingdom has the opportunity of making something of himself.

Then these are the days of trades-unions, which have very greatly helped to improve the condition of the working man.

These laws are all for the benefit of the poor, and should certainly lessen the misery of the whole community. Prosperity, however, does not always mean happiness.

What are the causes of misery? In our land, at any rate, much is caused by the wrong-doing of a certain class of individual. The passing of laws will not cure laziness. The shortening of the hours for the sale of intoxicating liquors has not lessened our drink bill. The passing of laws will not make the brutal man kind and considerate. It will not prevent lying or dishonesty. As an example of this, take the increase of thieving since the streets have been darkened, although there is no excuse for it now, as there perhaps was in the olden days, seeing that there is work for everybody.

Were poor environment the sole cause of misery, then all the rich would be happy, and all the poor miserable. But temperament counts for more than environment.

We are told in the scriptures that "the heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked". We are also told that "Man is born unto trouble, as the sparks fly upward". This has been man's lot since our first parents were turned out of the Garden of Eden. For, as Milton says,

"Man's first disobedience . . .

Brought death into the World, and all our woe". The why and wherefore of the troubles of life is the burden of Hamlet's famous soliloquy, where he says,

"Who would fardels bear,
To grunt and sweat under a weary life?"

We might almost take the answer to this from the exiled duke in "As You Like It", when he says,

"Sweet are the uses of adversity,
Which like the toad, ugly and venomous,
Wears yet a precious jewel in his head".

Trouble is sent as discipline to aid in the formation of character. Had we no trouble, we should rest satisfied with ourselves, and should aim at nothing higher. Just as a soldier is not a soldier until he has been tested by fire and hardship, so a man does not reach his full stature as a man until he has been tested and tried. Endurance makes for strength. Prosperity and ease do not strengthen: they tend to enervate. Each one must fight his own little battles; we are all alike in this. As there is no royal road to learning, so there is no royal road to goodness or happiness. A character is not built up in a day.

We are very much masters of our own destinies. In the same passage, Johnson continues: "Still to ourselves, in every place conigned,
Our own felicity we make or find".

A man's greatest sorrows are those caused by his own sins. What greater punishment can a man undergo than that which he suffers from a feeling of remorse—remorse for wrongs done by himself. It is like the canker worm at the heart of a rose, taking away all the sweetness from life. Solomon truly said, "The heart knoweth its own bitterness".

After all, the troubles of life make the joys shine the brighter. Gray says,

"The hues of bliss more brightly glow,
Chastised by sabler tints of woe".

We experience much joy from personal relations one with another, from domestic happiness and friendship. Also there are the pleasures derived from the study of Literature and Art, and from travel. Carlyle says, "Happiness is work, and misery the inability to work". I think we all know the feeling of satisfaction derived from the fact that some task, which at first appeared formidable, has been tackled and overcome by our own efforts. How many have found their salvation in real hard work! I think this is beautifully exemplified in the picture of the "Village Blacksmith", where

"Each morning sees some task begun,
Each evening sees its close,
Something attempted, something done,
Has earned a night's repose".

In conclusion, were *this* life everything, then laws and kings would hold a much more important place than they do; but the greater things are those which are not seen. They are not temporal, but spiritual. A man understands this more clearly as he draws near to the end of his days. Take the case of Cardinal Wolsey. He had been the greatest man in the kingdom in the early part of the reign of Henry VIII. Honours and dignities had been showered upon him; he opposed the king, and was disgraced. One would have expected him to be the most miserable of men. In Shakespeare's play, his friend and successor, Cromwell, comes in to see him,

and greets him with the words, "How doth your Grace"? What is the Cardinal's reply? He says, "Why, never so truly happy, my good Cromwell. I know myself now, and I feel within me a peace above all earthly dignities, a still and quiet conscience". That is a thing which laws and kings can neither give nor take away, and which will always prove our greatest comfort. There is a saying, "What can't be cured must be endured": the reward is to him that endureth to the end.

SECRETARY'S TERM REPORT.

How the society has managed to enjoy such a prosperous run this Term is hard to comprehend. The War, instead of reducing the membership or absolutely blotting the society out of existence, has, it seems, actually made it more flourishing than ever. Just as the children of Israel "multiplied and waxed very mighty" when persecuted in Egypt, the Society, in these troublous times, has gone on from strength to strength. Perhaps it has really not been so hard hit by the War as the children of Israel were by Pharaoh and their taskmasters.

So large, indeed, has the society grown, that a Junior Branch has been formed, composed of members of the Lower and Upper Fourth, with officers drawn from the Upper Fourth. The attendances throughout the term were magnificent, averaging about 56.

Much of this success is due to the continued interest taken in the society by several masters, especially Messrs C. C. Bell, J. W. Engvall, E. M. Maccoby, H. Ward, and C. K. Witter. The last-mentioned has, through his indefatigable exertions, helped the society in many ways, and, in his capacity as treasurer, has brought the funds to their present highly satisfactory condition. The society sincerely sympathizes with Mr. H. Ward, who was severely hurt through a tram-car accident, and was thus, to every Bedan debater's regret, incapacitated from attending meetings for several weeks. It is to be hoped that his interest in the society will not flag.

A full report of the "Cup Debate" occurs in this issue. The competitors were Messrs R. Keenlyside, D. A. S. Cairns, C. F. Porteus, J. Hindmarch, and N. Cooke. All acquitted themselves remarkably well, and the Headmaster, who adjudicated, awarded the cup to Keenlyside, placing Cairns second.

The Freshers' Debate was held at the 298th meeting, and Mr. C. C. Bell, adjudicating, awarded the prize to S. Cohen.

Mr. J. W. Engvall, the master of Form I, organized a most delightful concert held under the auspices of the society. Songs, recitations, piano solos, etc., were all very much enjoyed; but a sketch, "The Mock Turtle's Story", adapted by Mr. Engvall from "Alice in Wonderland", was most enthusiastically received. The entire con-

cert was a huge success, and Mr. Engvall is to be complimented on having in his Form so many clever little boys.

At the 292nd meeting, Mr. J. E. Marshall-Hall, A.R.S.M., gave a most enjoyable and highly interesting lecture on "Why Chemistry is taught in Schools". The lecturer first corrected some mistaken notions about chemistry's being a bag of tricks in which "stinks" and "bangs" figured prominently, and then began to show how useful Chemistry is in everyday life. An entertaining lecturer, and a thorough expert in his subject, he commanded the keen attention of his audience from first to last.

CORPORATION OF SUNDERLAND.

Sunderland Daily Echo, Nov. 27th, 1916.—A Bede School Success.—Peter B. R. Forbes, nephew and ward of Mr. Adam Ross, gardener, 10, Lorne Terrace, Sunderland, was on Friday last elected an Exhibitor of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. On the preceding Saturday he headed the list of successful candidates for six Drapers' Company's Scholarships, tenable at Oxford or Cambridge.

He is seventeen years old, has been at Bede School for five years, gained first-class honours certificates in the Oxford Local Junior and Senior Examinations in 1914 and 1915 (with distinction in Greek and Latin, and a pass in oral as well as written French on both occasions), and was placed in the first division at the London Matriculation Examination, June, 1916. In August this year he became a student teacher. He is a past holder of the School Debating Society's challenge cup. He will not go to Cambridge until his military service is over, and will join the army when eighteen.

As is usual in a case of a success like his, the school will have a half-holiday on Wednesday.

LIEUT. W. A. WEBSTER, M.C.

Lieut. Webster, son of Mr. W. A. Webster, 3, Grace Terrace, Sunderland, was at Bede School nearly seven years and left in 1909. He is remembered as in all ways a highly satisfactory pupil. He became an engineer, and, not long before the War began, passed the Intermediate Examn. for the London B.Sc. degree in Engineering.

Echo, Oct. 21st.—An Old Bedan's Honour.—Second-Lieutenant F. E. Canney, D.L.I., one of the recipients of the Military Cross, is 22 years old, and is the elder son of Mr. J. E. C. Canney, of East Boldon. With his brother, Second-Lieutenant J. R. Canney, R.G.A., he has seen a good deal of fighting, and was wounded on Dec. 15th, 1915. He was at Bede School for six years, and left in 1913. He is the third Old Boy to win

the Military Cross (which, the War Office has stated, ranks next to the Victoria Cross as an award for valour).

Echo, Oct. 30th.—Mr. G. T. Ferguson.—At a meeting of the Northern Branch of the Incorporated Association of Headmasters held at Darlington on Saturday Mr. G. T. Ferguson, B.A., B.Sc., headmaster of Sunderland Bede Collegiate School, was re-elected for a third year as the branch's senior representative on the Council of the Association, his colleague being Mr. J. Talbot, M.A., B.Sc., headmaster of Newcastle Royal Grammar School. The I.A.H.M., of which Mr. W. W. Vaughan, headmaster of Wellington College, is president this year, comprises the great majority of the headmasters of English Secondary Schools of nearly all the various types ranging from Eton and Harrow downwards. The Council meets in London, and to be one of the 26 elected members is always considered an honourable professional distinction.

Echo, Nov. 28th.—Another Bedan M.C.—Lieutenant (temporary Captain) Walter Robert Goodrick, who, as stated in last night's "Echo," has been awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous gallantry in action, is the son of Mr. William Goodrick, 30 General Graham Street, Sunderland, and attended Bede School for four years up to 1910, when he passed the Oxford Senior Local Examination, and also the Board of Education Preliminary Examination with distinction in English and science. Subsequently he was a student at Sunderland Training College.

In 1914 he was a sergeant in the 7th D. L. I. Afterwards he rose in the same Battalion to his present rank. Captain Goodrick is one of four Old Bedans who have gained the Military Cross, the others being Second Lieutenants Neill, Webster, and E. E. Canney. Of the four, Goodrick and Canney are young schoolmasters.

Pte. J. F. A. H. Lindsay, 5th Canadians, an Old Bedan, who was awarded the D. C. M. last January, has recently gained the Military Cross. Pte. Lindsay is a son of the Rev. W. Lindsay, Unitarian Minister, and Mrs. Lindsay, 33, Neale Street, Roker.

SUNDERLAND JEWISH SOLDIERS: MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR FALLEN.

An impressive service in memory of four Jewish soldiers of Sunderland killed in action in the War (two of whom, Corpl. Sydney Asher and Pte. Israel Jackson, were Old Bedans) was held in the Synagogue, Moor Street., on Nov. 1st. The Rabbi, Dr. Salis Daiches, and the Rev. L. Muscat (who has had three sons at the Bede

School) conducted the service, and the Rabbi preached the sermon.

The large congregation consisted mainly of members of the Jewish community of Sunderland, but contained not a few Gentiles, including Brigadier-General English, Major Cuthbert Vaux, and the Headmaster of Bede School.

The late BISHOP SWABY.

Dr. Swaby, who died at Bishop's Court, Barbados, on Nov. 16th, took a great interest in Bede School when he was a member of the Sunderland School Board, and afterwards sometimes wrote to the Headmaster both from British Guiana and Barbados.

It happens that one of the Masters now at Bede School, Mr. C. C. Bell, was for thirteen years Fifth Form Master at Harrison College, Barbados—the principal Secondary School in the West Indies.

ILLNESS OF MASTERS.

Speaking generally, we may say that members of the School Staff have *very seldom* been absent from duty on account of illness. In the Term now closing, however, more Masters have for certain periods been incapacitated by illness than in any other Term for many years past.

We may refer to two of the sufferers.

Mr. R. Simpson who, during his twenty years' service in the School, has given Manual Instruction in Woodwork to many hundreds of boys, and had, previous to this Term, *very seldom* been absent from illness, has in the past three weeks been laid up with inflammation in the side. Many Old Boys will read this with regret, and will, like the School, be glad to know that he has recently made rapid improvement, and fully expects to be able to resume his duties on January 11th, 1917.

Mr. H. Ward, the Senior French Master, when on his way to school on Nov. 7th, either fell off or was jerked off the step of a tram-car, and (his head colliding with an iron electric standard) sustained injury to his cheek-bone and concussion of the brain, and was rendered unconscious. At first the accident seemed as though it might have very serious consequences; but, to the surprise and satisfaction of everybody, Mr. Ward recovered so quickly that he managed to get back to school on Nov. 24th, and has kept steadily improving in health ever since.

MR. A. J. SMITH, M.A.

Mr. Angelo Smith is now a Master at Rugby. He was at Bede School for seven years as a boy and for three years as a Junior Master, and went

from there to Oxford in 1902 as an Exhibitioner of Brasenose College. After taking an Honours degree he became an Assistant Master at Loughborough Grammar School where, for several years past until a Term or two ago, he was Second Master. A very serious accident to his leg occurred some winters back one holiday when he was in Switzerland, and incapacitated him for military service—though that particular consequence of his injury probably *then* never once crossed his mind.

We remember him as a valued contributor to the *Bedan* throughout the early years of its life. Some lines of his appeared in the *first* Number (published in December, 1898,) and these were succeeded in subsequent issues by many verses from his facile, graceful pen.

EXAMINATION RESULTS, 1915-16.

During the School Year which ended on July 31st, 1916, there were—mainly owing to the War—numerous Staff changes and several brief periods of Staff shortage. Also, the number of boys in the School as a whole rose substantially, though there were no additional Masters. But, as a direct result of the War, the Sixth Form was badly depleted and the Upper Fifth adversely affected to some slight extent.

In these circumstances it would not have been surprising if the Results gained that year in External Examinations had compared very unfavourably with those of former years—especially as no departure was allowed from the general rule of the School that *every* Lower Fifth Form boy (whether good, bad, or indifferent) *must*, unless certified by a doctor as medically unfit, take the Oxford Local Junior Examination; and that, similarly, an Upper Fifth Form boy must take the Senior Examination, and a Lower Sixth Form boy the London Matriculation Examination.

However, *all* the Results were good. The little handful of boys constituting the Lower Sixth got 3 Firsts and 4 Seconds in the Matriculation. 45 L. V boys passed the Oxford Junior—19 with Honours.

But it is the *Senior* Results which deserve special mention. Though the 21 Upper Fifth boys were a young set (their average age when they took the Oxf. Senior in July, 1916, being 15 years 4 months), 16 gained Honours (8 First Class, 4 Second Class, 4 Third Class), 4 passed, and only *one* failed. 4 did well enough to be excused "Responsions" at Oxford. Several "Distinctions" were obtained, 4 being for Greek, and the rest for Latin, English, and History. 6 boys were successful in Oral French and 3 in Oral German.

The total number of Senior Candidates at all the various Centres was 9311, of whom 6022 passed. One Bedan (Share) was bracketed 7th on the General List, and two others (Lipton and Mincovitch) were bracketed 19th. Altogether, only 58 "Distinctions" in Greek were granted. Bede School's 4 was therefore a notable proportion.

We may mention that Joseph Porteus, who, in Dec. 1915, won an Open Mathematical Exhibition of £60 a year for three years, tenable at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, has spent part of the time since that date in the trenches in France as Rifleman J. Porteus, 19th K.R.R., but is now in England. He will be 19 years old next July.

THE SEATONIAN.

We have read with pleasure the current Number of the Whitley and Monkseaton High School Magazine. The clever, whimsical, delightful, and stimulating article entitled "The Call to serve" was, doubtless, the work of the skilful writer of more than one topical Latin Prologue declaimed in past years on Bede School Speech Day.

MR. J. W. FINDLATER, M.A., M. LITT.

After being a Master at Bede School for nine years, with History as his chief subject, Mr. Findlater left in September last to be Senior History and English Master at Luton Modern School. On completing a three years' course at Armstrong College, Newcastle, he graduated B. Litt. of Durham University in 1902. Subsequently he took the degrees of Master of Letters and Master of Arts.

Mr. Findlater was a thoughtful man with original ideas, and an earnest, capable, successful teacher. In the Oxford Jun. Loc. Exam. in July last, no fewer than 4 of his pupils got "Distinctions" in History. He sometimes gave a lecture in the Arts and Crafts Society; and, as he was a good violinist, the School Orchestra welcomed his occasional help. Everybody at Bede School (where his History work is now taken mainly by the Rev. A. Hooper, but partly by Mr. Black) wishes him prosperity in his new sphere.

MR. J. E. MARSHALL HALL, A.R.S.M.

As a substitute for Mr. (now Gunner) T. H. Blyth, Mr. Marshall Hall was appointed in June last a Master for Chemistry and Geography.

Mr. Hall was educated at Blackheath School, under Mr. Kempthorne (father of the Bishop of Lichfield), and at the Royal School of Mines, Lon-

don, where he had a four years' course in Science, and gained, with Honours, the diploma of Associate. After being two years chemist at the Rio Tinto Mines in Spain, he was for four years Assistant Chemistry Master at St. Paul's School, London. Then he had many years' experience with well-known Army Tutors as instructor in chemistry and physics. Subsequently, as consulting geologist on the staff of Sir Boverton Redwood, Bart., the world-famous petroleum expert, he travelled in many different countries (Poland, Galicia, Newfoundland, etc.) and made geological surveys.

Mr. Hall speaks Spanish, French, and German with facility. He is a cousin of Mr. H. S. Hall, well-known by name to all schoolboys as the joint-author (with Knight or Stevens) of many text-books on algebra, geometry, and other mathematical subjects.

MR. T. H. BLACK, M.A., B.Sc., LL.B.

In place of Mr. (now Gunner) C. W. Hildebrand, Mr. T. H. Black was appointed in June last a Master for mathematics, mainly.

Mr. Black had a brilliant career at Glasgow University from 1909 to 1916, first as student and then as professor's assistant. During this period he took the degrees of Master of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Laws, heading the list of successful candidates on each occasion; greatly distinguished himself in mathematics, but also obtained medals and first prizes in many other subjects (French, forensic medicine, constitutional history, etc.); gained eleven hundred pounds in scholarships and fellowships (the Robertson and the Ferguson Scholarships, the Ewing and the Metcalfe Fellowships, etc.); and, both in 1909 and 1910, won the Quarter-mile Running Championship of the University. He has been Swimming Champion of Huddersfield, and has played cricket and football as a member of good teams. But partial deafness compelled him some years ago to cease to be an active athlete; and defective vision, also, has prevented his being accepted for military service.

EX-SERGT. P. F. FULTON.

When Lieut. W. E. Liebrecht, the School's Drill Master before the War began, gave up his gymnasium work to resume military duties, Mr. John Rogers was appointed Temporary Drill Master, and acted as such from January, '15, until he went (in July, '16) to make munitions.

Since September last Mr. P. F. Fulton has been Drill Master. He served for 12 years in the Northumberland Fusiliers—10 years as a non-commissioned officer. At Suvla Bay, in August, '15, he lost his right arm. This necessitated his discharge from the Army. He has an artificial limb.

Mr. Fulton had some experience, in India and elsewhere, of teaching Swedish Drill to boys as well as to men. He keeps his pupils in splendid order,

exerts a wholesome influence, and carries out his duties assiduously and efficiently.

TO HELP BELGIAN CHILDREN.

CHRISTMAS ENVELOPES OF MERCY.

The National Committee for Relief in Belgium (Offices: Trafalgar Buildings, Trafalgar Square, London), consists of the Lord Mayor of London, the Belgian Minister, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Cardinal Bourne, the Moderator of the Church of Scotland, the President of the Free Church Council, the Chief Rabbi, the Duke of Norfolk, Lords Lansdowne, Rosebery, and Bryce, Mr. Arthur Henderson, and Mr. John Redmond.

The Committee has one object: to raise money for food (particularly soup, milk, cocoa, and biscuits) and simple medical attendance, for poor people (especially, poor children) in Belgium. The population of Belgium is seven millions, and, since October, 1914, every one of the two million children in Belgium has been a captive—at the mercy of the Germans.

It is quite impossible, in a note like this, to give even the barest outline of the operations and the methods of the Committee. Full details can be obtained from the Secretary. But the work seems to be Christ-like in character and very effective.

In consequence of rumours that food supplies intended for Belgians are sometimes diverted to the Germans, it may be well for us to direct attention to the Belgian Prime Minister's statement in *The Times*, July 1st, 1916—

"The Belgian Government are convinced that no appreciable leakage whatever has occurred or does occur as regards the food supplies which are imported into Belgium through the Relief Commission, and which are rendered *vitally necessary* by the inhuman refusal of the German Government to feed the population of the occupied territory."

On Breaking-up Day, Dec. 22nd, 1916, every Bede School boy was given an Envelope, and was told that if he or his friends at home liked to put something into it on Christmas Day or New Year's Day, and to bring such contribution to the funds of the Relief Committee to the School on Thursday or Friday, Jan. 11th or 12th, 1917, it would be gratefully accepted, acknowledged, and transmitted to the proper quarter.

Boys and Parents are, of course, perfectly free to give, or not to give, in response to this Appeal, and, if they do give, they can make their gifts as small or as large as they please.

The late COHN. J. W. JOHNSON.

Dec. 17th, 1916, was the first anniversary of the death of the late Chairman of the Governors. He is gratefully remembered at Bede School.

REGRETS FOR OMISSIONS.
