# OLD BEDANS' ROLL OF HONOUR.

In the FINAL FORM of which Roll it is hoped to place

## The NAMES of all OLD BOYS of BEDE SCHOOL (1890-1916)

Who were in any Branch of His Majesty's Military or Naval Forces  
During the GREAT WAR which began in 1914.

### EXPLANATORY NOTES.

A. An attempt has been made—partly by advertising in *The Times*, *Sunderland Daily Echo*, *Newcastle Daily Chronicle*, *Newcastle Evening Chronicle*, *Newcastle Daily Journal*, *North Mail*, and *Evening Mail*; partly by personal inquiries directed to Boys, Old Boys, Parents, and various other people—to procure information as to the (1) Name, (2) Rank, (3) Regiment, Ship, or other Section of the Army or Navy, and (4) Present Station, of EVERY OLD BOY now on military or naval service.

Also, information has been sought with regard to EVERY OLD BOY who, while serving in the War, has (1) Fallen, or (2) Become one of the Missing, or (3) Been Wounded, or (4) Been Taken Prisoner, or (5) Gained Special Distinction.

The particulars obtained have been in some cases full and exact; in others, copious but obscure or contradictory; in others, again, extremely scanty—perhaps a name, and nothing more. And there is good reason for believing that there are hundreds of Old Bedan soldiers and sailors whose bare names, even, have not been supplied.

B. The Roll here given is based upon the materials at present available. It is obviously incomplete, and is perhaps incorrect in several places. But, having been compiled with some amount of care in an honest endeavour to represent the facts as far as they are known, it is more likely to be unsatisfactory on account of omissions than by reason of important mistakes.

The Roll at present contains the Names of 570 Old Bedans (including several who left School to enlist), of whom 521 are in the Army and 49 in the Navy.

An Analysis based on RANK gives the following figures:

2 Naval Instrs., 1 Navig. Officer, 6 Sub-Lieuts., 6 Eng.-Sub-Lieuts., 1 Gunnery Sub-Lieut.).

[At the foot of the Roll appear the Names of 7 Bede School Masters (1 Killed in action) belonging to the Army. Not being Old Boys of the School, they are not included in the foregoing Analysis; but the Clerk, an Old Boy serving, is so included. Also, the Names of 5 Masters who Attested under Lord Derby's Scheme, are shown at the foot of the Roll.]

Another Analysis of the 570 Old Bedan Soldiers and Sailors in the Roll gives their PLACE of STATION as follows:—

British Isles, 270 (including Wounded and Invalided); British Overseas Dominions (chiefly India and Egypt), 25; At Sea, 46; Salonika and Mesopotamia, 20; France and Flanders, 209. Of the men shown as being in the British Isles, not a few are probably already abroad, and many others are certain to go abroad before long.

A Third Analysis of the Roll indicates the following facts with regard to Old Boys:—

Killed in action, 26; Died while on Active Service, 2; Wounded or Gassed, 53; Prisoners of War, in Germany, 5 (2 Wounded).

Decorations: Military Cross, 1; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 1; Cross of Chevalier of Legion of Honour, 1. Mentioned in Despatches, 3.

c. The figures placed after each Old Boy's Name in the Roll show the year of his leaving the School.

d. The GROWTH of the Roll has been steady. Here are the Dates when the different Drafts were printed, and the Number of Names in each Draft:—1st, Dec., '14, 180; 2nd, March, '15, 240; 3rd, July, '15, 320; 4th, Dec., '15, 440; 5th, April, '16, 515; 6th, July, '16, 570.

e. The Roll will be augmented and amended from time to time as additional information is received, and will be published afresh in each Number of *The Bedan* which appears during the War. My colleague Mr. (now Gun.) T. H. Blyth assisted me to compile the earlier Drafts. Mr. J. H. Smith-white has helped with the present one. With a view to making the Roll as comprehensive, as up-to-date, and as well-arranged as possible, we shall at all times be glad to receive particulars or suggestions from any quarter. Enlistments, promotions, changes in place of station, and the addition or the alteration of other items, daily combine to render the Roll somewhat kaleidoscopic: it varies in appearance almost incessantly, and is always attractive. To record each new piece of information is to us a labour of love: all that we ask is that anybody who notices anything erroneous or out-of-date in the Roll, or anything omitted which ought certainly to appear, will kindly write to us about the matter.

I specially appeal for Names and Particulars of Old Bedans now serving who were at the School fifteen, twenty, or twenty-five years ago. In many cases it is hard or impossible (mainly owing to changes of address) for me to trace nineteenth-century Old Boys. I therefore beg them, or their relatives or acquaintances, to favour me from time to time with a post-card giving such information as can be embodied in the Roll.

The whole SCHOOL is most grateful to Old Boys who have supported, or who are now supporting in arms the cause of King and Country, and also to their parents and friends. We are wishful and eager, as has already been indicated, to have a full list of those Old Boys' names. We shall watch, with pride, interest, sympathy, and affection, the careers of all Old Bedans taking part in the War; and we shall ever remember with special gratitude the men who fall. We hope and pray that, by making the supreme sacrifice, they may gain an even better reward than grateful remembrance. "Whosoever shall lose his life shall preserve it"; and an Old Bedan who dies in battle for the right may perhaps realise the full significance of his school motto *Post Tenebras Lux: After Darkness, Light.*

White stood about 6ft. 3in., was 30 years old, and looked the picture of health and good spirits when he visited Bede School a few weeks ago. Much sympathy is felt with his widow, whose present address is 30 Sea View, South Shields.]

## LITTLE ILLNESS AND FEW ACCIDENTS :

### THE SCHOOL'S GOOD RECORD.

BEDE SCHOOL was founded twenty-six years ago, and has never had fewer than three hundred boys. During two periods (one being the current year) the number of boys has slightly exceeded four hundred.

The general attendance is, and always has been, remarkably good. The Weekly Return has very rarely indeed, even under abnormal circumstances, shown an average attendance of less than ninety per cent of the pupils on the rolls. Usually the Weekly Percentage, relating to the whole school, is at least ninety-five; and, not seldom, it has risen to ninety-eight. In particular Forms, a weekly attendance of one hundred per cent is quite common.

In view of these facts, it is hardly necessary to state that the school has NEVER been the victim of any sort of epidemic. Many another school has, in a period extending over more than a quarter of a century, been plagued (perhaps more than once) to such an extent with infectious diseases that a miserable attendance for a time, or even the temporary closing of the place, has resulted. Bede School, however, has enjoyed better fortune. Once, many years ago, some nine or ten boys were, during part of a Term, absent owing to measles; but, except on that occasion, the school has, in respect of infectious diseases, either been able to show an entirely clean bill of health, or been troubled with only a few stray cases. Even when one, or two, or (very exceptionally) three boys have had to stay away from school on account of fever, "mumps", whooping-cough, diphtheria, or what not, the medical notification has, in the majority of instances, indicated that not the boys themselves, but their younger brothers or sisters, were the patients.

Of ordinary ailments—colds, coughs, headache, sickness, biliousness, and the like—Bedans doubtless get a share; but it has certainly never been a large share.

It may be remarked that the total number of boys, who have died from any illness while their names were still on the school registers as pupils, is exceedingly small—something like five, or six.

A fact with regard to the school's candidates for the Oxford Local Examinations is worth mentioning in this connexion, as illustrating well the general good health which the boys enjoy. For many years the school has regularly, towards the end of July, presented at these Examinations a fairly large number of boys: this year the number will be between seventy and eighty. The University Regulations require all such candidates to fill up their Entry Forms and pay their Entrance Fees early in May—ten or eleven weeks before the Examination takes place. There is plenty of time for a person who may be strong and vigorous on May 6th to become very unwell before July 17th. This year, indeed, one candidate certainly, and another possibly, will be medically unfit to take the Examination; but, in all preceding years put together, only two boy candidates have been similarly unfit!

Just as the School has been blessed with a large measure of freedom from illness, so it may well rejoice and be thankful over the matter of its comparative immunity from serious Accidents. It is, of course, almost unthinkable that any school of nearly 400 boys—many of them high-spirited, and not a few daring, or careless, or foolish, or mischievous—should, even if most favourably situated in all ways, go on for a long succession of years without any accidents whatever. But Bede School has some conditions and circumstances which, to say the least, are not entirely advantageous, so far as lessening the pupils' liability to accident is concerned. Only a few of the boys live near the School. Many have to make their way to and from it, day after day, through busy streets crowded with traffic, their homes being in more or less distant parts of Sunderland and the district. For years, scores of boys came in and went out, each day, by train. Even now, the "train" boys are not a negligible quantity.

Then the school premises are inadequate and scattered: to utilize every bit of class-room space that may be available as each successive lesson-period comes round, far more moving about must take place every forty minutes than would be necessary if the accommodation were ample. Under present conditions if, during a particular lesson-period, one Form goes to the Chemical Laboratory, another to the Physical Laboratory, another to the Manual Instruction Room, another to the Art Room, another to the Singing Room, another to the Gymnasium, and another to the Playing Field, the School is so full and the demand for space so insistent that all the class-rooms vacated by these Forms are forthwith

occupied by other Forms, transferred into them for the time being from various parts (near or remote) of the general buildings.

Also, the Gymnasium is at seven minutes' walk from the School in one direction, the Swimming Bath at seven minutes' walk in another, and the Playing Field at twenty minutes' walk in another.

Moreover, not only do Gymnastics, Football, Cricket, and Swimming cause the boys who take part in them to run certain small risks, but also some of the ordinary subjects of the School Curriculum—for instance, Chemistry, Physics, and Woodwork—cannot be studied without some slight measure of hazard. Acids, flasks of boiling water, and edged tools must always require careful handling.

People would, however, make a great mistake if they concluded from all this that accidents to Bede School boys are incessant. As a matter of fact, they occur exceedingly seldom; a thing due to the good sense of the vast majority of the pupils, to the School's General Rules (designed to meet all ordinary cases), to Special Directions given whenever considered necessary, and to the Masters' Supervision.

Considering the hundreds of millions of railway journeys, long or short, taken in England every year, and the extraordinarily small number of passengers killed (as shown in the Official Annual Report), statisticians sometimes contend that a railway carriage in England is the safest place in the world for anybody to be in. As bearing on this matter it may be stated that no boy while travelling by rail to or from Bede School has ever come to any harm; but it will be remembered that the late Chairman of the Governors, and his son, lost their lives in a lamentable railway disaster.

Motor-cars have affected many people in many ways, and are things with which at least two Bedans, when youngsters, were brought into violent contact. One boy, while running or playing in Chester Road, was knocked down by a motor-car and had his leg broken. This "little pickle" was so lively and sportive that, when recovering in the Children's Hospital, he broke his leg over again! His adventurous past does not seem to have done him the slightest permanent injury. Another boy, having started to run at the top of the sloping path which leads from the Play Park down into Burdon Road near the railway bridge, was crossing Burdon Road at a great rate and making for the gate of the Park opposite when a motor-car, going towards the town, ran over him—in spite of the chauffeur's best efforts—and dragged him some distance. The circumstances were such that spectators feared that the boy, when extricated, would almost certainly be dead. There was, however, no such dreadful result. On being got out from

under the car he soon showed plenty of signs of life, and, caked with mud, was taken forthwith to a doctor who, after a thorough examination, said that his hurts were not serious. Three weeks later he returned to school, all right again. One beneficial consequence of this particular motor-car accident (which, like that previously mentioned, happened years ago) was the erection of a strong iron railing in Burdon Road, opposite to the north-east exit from the Play Park. Boys *cannot* now rush, at that point, straight out of the Park into possible danger from tram-cars or motor-cars going down Burdon Road.

No boy has ever had a *fatal* accident at, or in any way connected with Bede School.

Such the most serious accident which has ever happened on the premises occurred about seventeen years ago. During the mid-day interval a boy began to twirl a stout stick round his head, aimlessly—and senselessly. Soon after he had started this silly game, and before anybody had stopped him or even noticed him, he most unfortunately struck another boy in the eye, and injured it so much as to make its removal necessary. In many—perhaps in most—school accidents the sufferers, though one is sorry for them in any case, have themselves done something to cause their own misfortunes; but, in this instance, the quiet, fine-natured lad who lost his eye was a victim entirely blameless, and received the school's whole-hearted, unmixed regret and sympathy.

Not a single misadventure worth the least notice has ever happened to any boy in the Physical Laboratory. Once, however, many years ago, the Physics Master slipped somehow on the top step of the first-built staircase (now never used by boys) leading to that laboratory, and fell right to the bottom! He was sore for a fortnight afterwards.

The Workshop might reasonably be expected to be a place where blood is shed occasionally. The saws, planes, and chisels are kept very sharp, and many of the tool-users are young and inexperienced. But the boys, especially the little ones, are told so carefully and so exactly what to do and what not to do, and the benches and appliances are so well contrived that a youngster's chance of harming himself is reduced to a minimum. Rarely, some small worker is wilful, and handles a chisel or attempts a piece of work in the very way which he has been cautioned to avoid. Generally he is detected in the act and checked before mischief ensues. Sometimes, on the other hand, he cuts his finger, or incurs some other more or less slight injury. He then, most probably, goes straight to Mr Smithwhite, and gets his wounds bound up.

[Mr Smithwhite is a Master whose kindness of heart, knowledge of ailments, and skill in using

to full advantage all the resources of a School First Aid Box, have made him in a special degree a sort of Good Samaritan and provisional Medicine Man to boys the victims of small mischances at school. This opportunity is taken to thank him and all other Masters who have done good offices to boy-patients.]

Only one really alarming occurrence has ever taken place in the workshop. There is a right method, and there are several wrong methods, of removing a planing iron from a plane. A biggish boy—now a man, well-known before the War as a rather good cricketer—one day knocked the iron out of a plane in such a way that it fell towards the floor. Unfortunately the iron landed on the top of the boy's boot, and, cutting through both it and his stocking, gashed his foot. Things looked somewhat gory for a few moments; but the wound was bound up as quickly as possible, and, a cab having been got at once, the lad had gone to the Infirmary, had had four stitches put into his foot, and was on his way home, all in a surprisingly short time. A full month elapsed before he could be at school again.

During recent years there has, happily, never been, in the Chemical Laboratory, an untoward occurrence important enough to be called an accident. During the closing decade of the nineteenth century the Boys' Chemistry Course was, on the whole, more hazardous than that now followed. It did not make mishaps by any means inevitable; but they used to come if there was carelessness or too much audacity. Most of them were trivial in character and consequences. Two, not trivial, call for mention.

One day a Master, lecturing on chemistry, did some experiments with two substances which, when kept separate, may be handled freely without danger, but which, if brought together and heated or ignited, explode with great force and a loud report. Having worked the experiments to illustrate a principle, he reminded the Form that he had purposely used very minute quantities of the two substances, and yet had produced big detonations. He therefore warned the boys *never* to mix the two substances in question, and said, indeed, that he would never give them the chance of forming this dangerous combination.

What his statement meant was that, though one of the substances (a very ordinary re-agent) could be found on every bench in the laboratory, the other would never be accessible to boys—the whole stock of it, which was small, being kept in the master's store-room. Needless to say, no boy is, or has ever been, permitted to take chemicals from the general laboratory—much less from the store-room—and carry them off the premises for his own use.

But the power of making a big noise in the world seems to have had an overmastering at-

traction for one particular boy. The experiments evidently fascinated him. At any rate he somehow managed, one day, to secure a little of the rarer substance: he must have got it out of a small bottle which stood on the highest shelf of the store-room, about eight feet from the floor. He also took a little of the common re-agent; a thing much easier to do. Carrying the substances in his pocket in bits of paper, he went off homewards at the end of afternoon school. Having gone about a quarter of a mile he took the substances out of his pocket and held them in his hand. Doubtless he had intended to place a few grains of the mixture upon the pavement, stamp upon it with his heel-plate, and produce a loud report. But the heat of his hand caused the whole mixture to explode while he was holding it. The detonation was tremendous, and alarmed many people in the quiet street where it occurred. The poor lad was blown down, and, at first, his entire hand appeared to be injured beyond remedy. Surgical skill and good nursing, however, eventually saved him everything except the whole of one finger and about one-half of a second.

The other notable accident in connexion with the Chemical Laboratory occurred on the premises, several years later. Strange to say, the cause was the explosion of the same two substances as in the first case! But the conditions were altogether different. The pupil concerned, instead of being about fourteen years of age, and a comparative novice in chemistry, was a youth, an advanced student, the best chemist the school has ever produced, and one who, three or four years afterwards, took a First Class Honours degree in Chemistry at the very University where such a distinction is, perhaps, hardest to get. He knew as well as anybody the properties of the two substances aforesaid, and had full permission to use—of course, in a proper manner—these and other materials for some experimental work in which he was engaged. How the two substances were brought together has never been explained. What is unquestionable is that the Laboratory suddenly resounded with a noise like a thunder-clap, and that the experimenter was found nearly blinded for the time being, suffering from shock, his face in the main as white as a ghost but pitted at intervals with black grains of the exploded materials.

Several persons were at his side in a moment, one of the first being his school chum and bosom friend (an Oxford man now an officer in India); but nobody heard him utter the slightest cry or groan, though the pain that he had to bear must have been intense. His sight had never been very good—perhaps that was the true explanation of the accident—and his masters and comrade feared most that the flying chemicals might



have damaged or ruined his eyes. However, after spending a fortnight in the Infirmary and a fortnight at home, he was restored to his usual health and to the school. Wonderful to relate, his eyes had received no injury at all.

Curiously, the victim of this accident, though he bore it gamely, always contended that it was inexplicable—because (he stoutly asserted) the conditions necessary for its occurrence were not present. The question, though technically interesting, cannot be argued here. Even in *chemistry*—as in love, politics, and many other things—it is often the unexpected which happens?

The School could not have gained and maintained its fine tradition for Swimming if many hundreds of Bedans, present and past, had not made frequent visits to the Bath. These visits have hardly afforded a single incident that could be styled a misadventure. Once a boy, swimming in a race, found that, when making the turn at the end of the Bath, he had put his shoulder out! But this was not very alarming—for his shoulder, whether he was on land or in water, had a way of "coming out" occasionally with little or no provocation. Besides, he was (and is) so fine a swimmer that, even with a dislocated shoulder, he would be by no means helpless in the Bath.

At the Debating Society's Picnics one boy bathing in Talkin Tarn, and another bathing in the Devil's Water near Hexham, got into difficulty for a moment or two; but they were never in peril, other members of the party who were powerful swimmers promptly rendering them assistance.

One year, at the School Camp at Daddry Shield, a boy, when crossing the stepping stones, fell and broke his arm. A doctor set the injured limb immediately, and it thereafter distressed its owner so little that, next day, he insisted on taking a walk of over twenty miles planned for his companions, and did the round as well as any of them.

The Gymnasium has been the scene of wonderfully few mishaps. Only two deserve mention. A boy once fell down the stairs leading from the Gymnasium Hall to the dressing room. The fall happened in such a way that he might have done himself serious permanent injury. In reality, he got nothing worse than a shaking and some bruises, and was soon quite well again. A fall in just the same way cannot now recur.

Once a boy, having vaulted over the "horse", fell on the mattress with his arm *under* him, and broke the arm. This was a *pure* accident—if ever there was one; all the circumstances being such that neither the boy nor anybody else could be regarded as in any way to blame. Subsequent examination showed that his arm-bones were thin and slight to a quite exceptional degree.

No one has ever been seriously injured at the Playing Field. Of course, small mishaps there are not uncommon. Anything like deliberate foul play is reprehended and vigorously punished; but natural eagerness, the excitement of the game, the tricky condition of the ground, rain, wind, a sudden blaze of sunshine full in the eyes, a faulty boot or bat or ball, or many another cause, will sometimes lead the fairest and most honourable footballer or cricketer to hurt an opponent, or a member of his own team, or himself.

Some years ago a Bedan (now an officer), when playing football in a School match at Stockton, made the Masters in charge very anxious—for he seemed to have put his hip out, and it was only with considerable difficulty that he could be conveyed to his home at East Boldon. Fortunately his injury proved to be nothing more than a very severe twist of the muscles, and he made a slow but perfect recovery.

Knee twists, and painful kicks on the shin or ankle, have occurred now and then; and, when cricket used to be played on the Durham Road field—before the much superior Hendon field, now available in the Summer Term, could be hired—the erratic bouncing of the ball from the hard, uneven ground, gave two or three boys a black eye. One big, powerfully-built fellow (now an officer) was notorious, towards the end of his school life, for being often "in the wars" both in games and elsewhere. When coming to school, one very windy day, he unluckily contrived to intercept a falling slate! Just at that period he seemed fated to miss nothing bad that was going! However, as his injuries were never very serious, and as his prowess in swimming and football had given him a reputation for great strength, he perhaps got less than a proper share of sympathy: people used to say "So-and-so can stand anything".

Often there are sixty or seventy boys' bicycles at the School. Yet cycling accidents in connexion with the place have been rare, and, generally, of little consequence. The most serious happened to Mr. Jarman who, when cycling to school one morning a few months ago, had a bad side-slip near the Royalty corner, at a point where the street was very greasy and slippery. He sustained a particularly nasty fall, and felt the effects of it for some weeks.

If a careful, experienced rider, going over ground familiar to him for many years, cannot be sure of immunity from accident, it is not surprising that boy-cyclists, with far less judgment, knowledge, and skill, should be liable to misadventure. Once a boy, cycling to the playing field, inadvertently dropped a football which he was carrying: it fell in such a way as to bring him off his machine immediately—and not without a certain amount of harm.



Just last month two little boys collided, when riding down Park Lane. One of them was hurt slightly.

Quite recently a person much interested in Bede School saw an incident, which happily did not develop into an accident, but which for a moment or two looked very much like doing so, and was most exciting. A bicycle carrying two rather big Bedans—one on the saddle, the other on the step—came suddenly from a side road into a main thoroughfare, in which a tram-car and a motor-cycle, going in opposite directions, were nearly abreast of each other. The boy-pilot did not see how complicated the situation was likely to be, until he had gone too far to get out of it. As matters were, the only possible way to avoid a collision was to ride parallel with the tram-car in the narrow space between it and the motor-cycle; and that space happened to be ill-paved and uneven. However, the boy made for it without hesitation, and, though his doubly-laden machine swayed about ominously, he managed to get out of a tight place without harm to anybody—except the fright he had given to onlookers.

This Article has grown to proportions which, at the outset, the writer never intended that it should assume. Most of the events with which it deals belong to ancient history; several of them took place before any boy now in the School was born. It gives a fairly comprehensive indication of all the accidents in any way serious, and of some certainly not serious, which have happened to Bede boys since 1890; and it shows that the number of the former class has—in view of the School's size, circumstances, and length of life—been very small.

In conclusion, a few words about recent minor mishaps, a little advice to be careful, and a general caution against roughness and recklessness, may be interesting, useful, and salutary.

In the last two years the pupils have grown more and more numerous. The strain which this has put upon every part of the premises has made itself perhaps more evident in the *play-ground*—as distinct from the playing field—than anywhere else. When all the boys are together there, it is quite impossible for them to play the simplest games, or even just to run about freely; they can get the fresh air, and stand and talk, and be ready for assembly-time; but they have precious little room for active moment. Now, boys do not like to be restrained, or to restrain themselves, *in a play-ground*—so-called; and, within the period named, the play-ground has been the scene of several little untoward incidents.

Separately, they were perhaps "nothing much". For example, boisterous A, while darting after B, unintentionally upsets quiet, little C, who scratches his elbow and makes his jacket "a

pretty mess". D, E, and F, scurrying from different directions, somehow manage to bump into one another: they carry home sundry marks as mementos of their impromptu *mêlée*. G, a boy with "shorts" like a scout's, trips himself up on the asphalt, and skins his knees. And so on, in considerable variety.

Most of such cases are investigated. Some appear to have been unavoidable: at any rate they point out nobody as plainly blameworthy. Others reveal real culprits, and retribution follows—more or less severe according to the nature of the offence.

Since all school accidents, whether great or small, are to be regretted (especially if the victims of them have been in no way culpable), and since CARELESSNESS, though by no means their only, is without doubt their most frequent cause, Bede School boys are strongly urged to try to be habitually cautious and observant—even in the play-ground.

This may seem to them a harsh, unnatural injunction. Knowing the narrow limits of their premises and recreation space, they may say "We, and generations of our predecessors, have always been, like Macbeth,

Cabin'd, cribb'd, confined, bound in.

We have heard so often of more spacious quarters about to be ours, and have been so often disappointed, that now, with Tennyson, we can only

Faintly trust the LARGER hope.

And, surely, it's too bad to ask us to walk warily on the little patch of ground that *does* belong to us. We want *more* freedom, not *less*".

If they say this, let them remember that

Freedom broadens SLOWLY down;

and while patiently bearing present restrictions from a sense of their reasonableness under existing conditions, let them cheer up their hearts with Charles Mackay's fine old song:

There's a good time coming, boys!

A good time coming.

## SWIMMING.

The club commenced its practices again at the beginning of this Term, and judging by the attendances on the different evenings, there seems to be promise of a good season—for the average number of boys per practice has been about 70. This shows a marked improvement on the figures for the opening weeks of last season, and also that the club remains as popular as ever.

The enthusiasm and interest shown have been quickened and heightened by the renewal of the Shields' competitions, into which the Forms have entered with great keenness. This keenness is more marked in the Lower School than anywhere else, for throughout the competitions the Juniors have shown much pluck, there being no hesitation by them to take the plunge from the "second splash-board" from which many just tumble in, thus gaining at least one mark for their Form.

There are two shields—the Seniors' and Juniors'—the competitions for which deal with the three branches of swimming, namely:—Life-saving, Squadron races, and Diving, the winners being the two Forms in each section obtaining the highest percentage of marks. Of course, marks for certificates obtained during the season are also considered and added to those won during the competitions.

## EDITORIAL NOTES AND SCHOOL NEWS.

### NEXT TERM.

All New Pupils—the number of candidates for admission already examined and accepted is large—are to be present on Tuesday, September 12th. The School as a whole assembles on Wednesday, September 13th.

The Fees of Present Pupils are to be paid on Monday, September 11th.

If a fee is paid by cheque, the cheque should be made payable to CORPORATION OF SUNDERLAND. Hitherto there has been no rule on that point, and cheques have come drawn in favour of the Headmaster, the School, the Governors, the Education Authority, and other persons or bodies. This has made different endorsements of different cheques necessary. Besides, the lack of unanimity, on the part of the drawers, as to the number and the order of the letters in the Headmaster's name and in the word Collegiate, sometimes caused one and the same cheque to have to be endorsed twice.

The uniform use of

### PRESENT TERM.

The late date of Easter, 1916, has made this Term one of the shortest on record. And it has been one of the busiest.

Several new pupils came on the Opening Day, May 10th.

The Examination of Candidates for New Exhibitions took place on May 18th, at the School. The premises being thus occupied, there was a holiday for all Boys—but not for the Staff.

The Daylight Saving Act, which came into legal operation on Sunday, May 21st, received practical adoption at Bede School on the following day—and did so as painlessly and noiselessly there as in other places.

On June 2nd Professor Latham took the Oxford Local Special Examinations in Oral French and Oral German.

On June 6th a railway rolleyman, while delivering a parcel at the School, made the momentous announcement that Lord Kitchener had been drowned on the previous night, Monday, June 5th. We sent at once and got an *Echo*. The news produced a profound impression in the Common Room, the Sixth Form Room, and wherever it penetrated. Suitable allusion both to Lord Kitchener's death and also to the Jutland Naval Battle (May 31st and June 1st) was made by the

Headmaster, at School assembly, a few days after these events.

The London Matriculation Examination lasted from June 13th to June 16th.

In response to the appeal of the Board of Education and of His Worship the Mayor of Sunderland, the holidays ordinarily taken at Whitsuntide were this year postponed. Instead of coming on June 9th, 12th, and 13th, they came—to the surprise and great delight of many boys, who cheered "like anything"—on June 23rd, 26th, and 27th.

The weather was atrocious at Whitsuntide, and, even for the deferred holidays, we got rather more rain than sunshine.

James Russell Lowell said

"And what is so rare as a day in June?

Then, if ever, come *perfect days*".

In reply to the poet's statement there are many people in Sunderland who, remembering the June of 1916, will henceforward be inclined to say "Perhaps!", or "Mebbis!"—if they use the vernacular.

The General Entrance Examination for candidates desiring admission to the School on Sept. 12th was held on July 10th. Even more boys than usual attended. Most of them qualified, and were accepted.

The Oxford "Locals" began on July 13th for candidates taking Greek, and on July 14th for candidates in general.

#### VARIOUS "DAYS".

May 24th was Empire Day. The School heard a short address, and sang the National Anthem.

June 28th was Kossovo Day, the national fête day of Serbia, one of our gallant Allies. For the three centuries between the Norman Conquest of England and the death of our King Edward III Serbia was an important kingdom—though English boys do not read much about it in their history books.

The most famous of Serbian monarchs, Stephen Dushan, was crowned Tsar in 1346. On his death rival princes caused civil war—instead of combining against the Turks, who were then threatening or conquering several parts of South-Eastern Europe. In 1389, on 28th June (15th Old Style), the Turkish Sultan defeated the Serbian Tsar Lazar on the Plain of Kossovo: this decisive battle led to the conquest of the whole Balkan Peninsula by the Turks, and, soon afterwards, the Serbs lost their independence. But they never forgot Kossovo Day—just as generations of Scotsmen never forgot Flodden; and, in 1804, the Serbians began, under Kara George (whose grandson is their present King Peter), to free themselves from the Turkish yoke. Their

history since then is a tangled skein. Until recent years most English boys knew little of Serbia, except as a country which produced enormous numbers of pigs and enormous quantities of plums and jam, and which seemed to have unceasing internal dissensions (there being too many claimants for the throne) as well as frequent strife with its neighbours. But the heroic part, which Serbia has played in the wars of 1911 and 1913 and in the world-conflict begun in 1914, has awakened a more general interest in all that relates to the Serbs; and, on Kossovo Day, Bedans listened appreciatively to the short account which the Headmaster gave them of what that Day means, and of the hopes and the ideals of the valiant people found giving it, every year, a patriotic commemoration.

July 14th.—"le quatorze juillet", as it is called across the Channel—is the National Fête Day of France, and recalls the storming and capture of the Bastille, on that date in 1789, by the common people of Paris. That great castle-prison had come to be looked upon as a symbol of the tyranny and misgovernment which France was suffering and had suffered for generations, and its fall was one of the outstanding events in the French Revolution: a series of tremendous acts, many of which were evil and horrible, but which, as a whole, promoted human progress and freedom all over the world.

On July 14th the School sang *La Marseillaise*, in French. Monsieur Bernard had taken pains to teach the boys the words, and Mr. Jarman had given attention to their rendering of the music; and the famous hymn went well. Three hearty cheers for France and Belgium followed.

April 23rd, 1916 (Easter Sunday, as it happened) was the Tercentenary of Shakespeare's death. The Tercentenary was observed by the Sunderland Shakespearean Society on May 1st, on which occasion the Headmaster of Bede School had the honour of proposing the toast of the Immortal Memory of the Bard of Avon—the greatest of Englishmen and greatest of the world's poets.

At a Concert last Term, and in certain indirect ways this Term, the School has done something to mark the Tercentenary; but, to our great regret, we have not yet been able to hold anything in the nature of a formal, elaborate Celebration—though Mr. Jarman has kindly given the boys all the musical preparation necessary. The absence of an Assembly Room, a drawback which the School feels every day, is a special difficulty when any big gathering is to be held or prepared for; but want of time has been the *main* obstacle in the way of the School's keeping a Tercentenary Festival on a suitable scale. Perhaps next Term may be favourable for such an enterprise.



## STAFF CHANGES.

## MR. T. H. BLYTH.

Mr. Thos. Hope Blyth, B.Sc., has joined the Army for the duration of the War, and is now a gunner in the R.G.A., Yarmouth. He left the school on June 2nd.

Mr. Blyth came to Bede School nearly eighteen years ago, and has for a long time been Senior Master for Chemistry and Geography. Among his credentials are Board of Education Honours Certificates in Chemistry and Geology. He was educated at Armstrong College, Newcastle, where he took the Durham University Science degree and distinguished himself as a footballer. For some time he played for Newcastle in the First League Team, and is well known in the North of England as a referee. For years he was an active member of the Hendon Cricket Club. He is musical, is in the Sunderland Philharmonic Choir, and used to be an organist.

Mr. Blyth has done much valuable work at Bede School. He knows his subjects, teaches with great clearness and good methods, keeps all his books and records in capital order, and has been Chairman of the Joint Committee of Masters and Boys which manages the School Games. He gave the Headmaster a considerable amount of assistance in compiling the Roll of Honour. Big, strong, personable, and trustworthy, he has always been liked and respected. Though the last man in the world to be quarrelsome, he would, we should imagine, be an "awkward customer" to tackle—either on the battlefield or in any other place of combat. We wish him well.

We regret that Mr. Blyth's son has recently broken his arm rather badly, through falling from a pony.

## MR. C. W. HILDEBRAND.

Mr. Christopher Webb Hildebrand, B.A., who left the school on June 7th, has joined the Army for the duration of the War, and, like Mr. Blyth, is now a gunner in the R.G.A., Yarmouth.

When a boy in schools at Sligo and Portlinton he had numerous successes in the Intermediate Examinations of the Irish Board. He holds several Board of Education Certificates for Mathematics. At Trinity College, Dublin, he was Mathematical Scholar and Senior Exhibitor, and took an Honours degree in mathematics, logic, and English Literature.

Mr. Hildebrand held teaching posts in Dublin, Belfast, and Croydon, before coming to Bede School more than seven years ago. He is well known in the School as a good mathematician, a good teacher, a man of wide general attainments, and a humorist: to hear him sing some of Percy French's comic songs—especially "Matt Hannigan's Aunt" and "The Mountain of Mourne"—was always a treat.

He has the School's good wishes.

## MR. P. WAYMAN.

Mr. Paul Wayman, Clerk at the School for over ten years, left on June 12th, on joining the Army for the duration of the War, and is a Private in the Army Service Corps at Aldershot.

Mr. Wayman was a boy at Bede School on its Opening Day: he—like Mr. R. W. Willis and like Mr. R. F. Jarman—had previously been one of Mr. Ferguson's pupils at another school.

For some years before returning to Bede School as Clerk, he was the representative of an engineer and iron merchant in Newcastle. He had a good knowledge of general office-work, including book-keeping, and, when Clerk to the Headmaster, made himself thoroughly competent to deal with the various official forms—far more numerous and intricate than many outsiders might suppose that they would be—which are a part of the machinery of the School. Loyal, sensible, acute, and devoted to the interests of the place which he served, he discharged his duties faithfully, exerted a wholesome influence, and was deservedly liked and trusted.

Mr. Wayman used to be churchwarden at St. Hilda's. He is fond of books and music, and has a wide range of friends and acquaintances who, whether they are Bedans or not, send good wishes to him in his new capacity.

His boy, Paul Wayman the younger, is now at the School.

## NEW MASTERS.
