Who were in any Branch of His Majesty's Military or Naval Forces
During the GREAT WAR which began in 1914.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

A. An attempt has been made to procure information as to the (1) Name, (2) Rank, (3) Regiment, Ship, or other Section of the Army or Navy, and (4) Present Station, of EVERY OLD BOY on military or naval service at any time during the War.

Also, information has been sought with regard to EVERY OLD BOY who, while serving in the War, has (1) Fallen, or (2) Become one of the Missing, or (3) Been Wounded, or (4) Been Taken Prisoner, or (5) Gained Special Distinction.

B. The Roll here given is based upon the materials at present available, and contains the names of 770 Old Bedans (including several who left School to enlist), of whom 700 are or were in the Army or Air Service and 70 in the Navy.

An Analysis based on RANK gives the following figures:

a. ARMY: 203 Officers (1 Major, 36 Captains, 1 Chaplain, 56 Lieutenants, 109 Sec.-Lieutenants).

160 Non-Commissioned Officers (1 Co. Sergt.-Major Instructor, 1 Co. Sgt. Major, 1 Co. Q.M. Sgt., 1 Batty. Q.M. Sgt., 1 Squadron Q.M. Sgt., 4 Staff-Sgts., 4 Q.M. Sgts., 1 Farrier Sgt., 2 Sgt. Instructors, 51 Sgts., 2 Lance-Sgts., 38 Corporals, 37 Lance-Corporals, 15 Bombardiers, 1 Drill Instructor).

312 Men (202 Privates, 6 Riflemen, 52 Gunners, 11 Drivers, 10 Troopers, 2 Pioneers, 20 Sappers, 2 Telegraphists, 1 First Air Mechanic, 5 Second Air Mechanics, 1 Trumpeter).

b. NAVY: 35 Officers (12 Lieutenants, 6 Eng.-Lieuts., 1 Lieut.-Gunner, 1 Navigating Officer, 2 Naval Instrs., 7 Sub-Lieuts., 4 Eng.-Sub-Lieuts., 1 Chief Eng., 1 Sec.-Engineer).

35 Warrant or Petty Officers, Men and Boys (1 Warrant Eng., 1 Eng. Instructor, 1 Chief E.R.A., 13 E.R. Artificers, 1 Signalman, 1 Gunner, 2 Wireless Operators, 2 Writers, 1 Able Seaman, 4 Ordinary Seamen, 1 Man in Armourer's Crew, 1 Cook's Mate, 2 Stokers, 4 First-Class Boys).

[At the foot of the Roll appear the Names of 8 Bede School Masters (1 Killed in action) belonging to the Army. Not being Old Boys of the School, they are not included in the foregoing Analysis; but the Clerk, an Old Boy serving, is so included. Next are given the Names of 3 Sons of Masters, belonging to the Army (including 1 Killed in action and 2 Wounded): these are not Old Bedans. Also, the Names of 5 Masters who Attested under Lord Derby's Scheme, are shown at the foot of the Roll. One of these is an Examiner in the A.I.D.]

c. Summary of CASUALTIES.—Killed in action or Died of Wounds, 77; Died while serving, 3; Missing, 4; Wounded, Gassed, or Shell-Shocked, 114; Prisoners of War, 6; Total, 204.

d. Summary of DECORATIONS and DISTINCTIONS.—Military Cross, 18; Bar to Military Cross, 1; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 2; Military Medal, 8; Bar to Military Medal, 2; Distinguished Service Medal, 1; Cross of Chevalier of Legion of Honour, 1; Mentioned in Despatches, 7; Total, 40.

- E. PLACE OF STATION of Men still serving.—British Isles, 217 (including Wounded and Invalided); British Overseas Dominions (chiefly India and Egypt), 31; Italy, 3; Palestine and Persia, 5; At Sea, 65; Salonika, 17; Mesopotamia, 10; Germany, 6; France and Flanders, 336; Total, 690.

[N.B.—80 have been killed in action, or have died while serving.]

Of the men shown as being in the British Isles, not a few, probably, are already abroad, and many others are certain to go abroad before long.

F. The figures placed after each Old Boy's Name in the Roll show the year of his leaving the School.

a. The GROWTH of the Roll has been steady. Here are the Dates when the different Drafts were printed, and the Number of Names in each Draft:—1st, Dec., '14, 180; 2nd, March, '15, 240; 3rd, July, '15, 320; 4th, Dec., '15, 440; 5th, April, '16, 515; 6th, July, '16, 570; 7th, Dec., '16, 627; 8th, July, '17, 730; 9th, Dec., '17, 770.

h. Though hundreds of hours have been willingly and gladly devoted to the collection and arrangement of particulars, the Roll is probably incorrect in places, and is without doubt very incomplete. It will be augmented and amended from time to time as additional information is received, and will be published afresh in each Number of *The Bedan* which appears during the War. My colleague Mr. (now Gunner) T. H. Blyth assisted me to compile the earlier Drafts. Mr. J. H. Smithwhite has helped with the last four.

Readers will observe that the present Draft, unlike the earlier ones, fails to specify the battalion or battery to which a man belongs, and leaves out nearly all exact details about him. The omissions have been made deliberately, to comply with a widely-issued War Office Notice, the aim of which is to prevent the Inadvertent Disclosure of Military Information in periodicals, rolls of honour, reports of war work, and similar publications.

But a Record is kept at the School of such things as an Old Boy's battalion, his address, etc.—though, of course, it will not be printed until it can be published freely.

I particularly beg that anybody who notices anything erroneous or out-of-date in the Roll, or any name omitted which ought certainly to appear, will kindly write to me about the matter. Often a few lines on a post-card will suffice.

The whole SCHOOL is most grateful to Old Boys who support in arms the cause of King and Country, and also to their parents and friends. We are wishful and eager, as has already been indicated, to have a full list of those Old Boys' names. We shall watch, with pride, interest, sympathy, and affection, the careers of all Old Bedans taking part in the War; and we shall ever remember with special gratitude the men who fall. We hope and pray that, by making the supreme sacrifice, they may gain an even better reward than grateful remembrance. "Whosoever shall lose his life shall preserve it" (Luke xvii. 33); and an Old Bedan who dies in battle for the right may perhaps then first realise the full significance of his school motto *Post Tenebras Lux: After Darkness, Light.*

OVERFLOWING NUMBERS.

With 437 Boys the School is fuller and more crowded than ever. Into most of the Forms it is quite impossible to admit another pupil. We already have a waiting-list for chance vacancies occurring during the year (though these are rare), and for places which will doubtless be available next September.

STAFF CHANGES.

At the Midsummer Holidays we lost, with regret, Mr. C. C. Bell, B.A., late Exhibitioner of Queen's College, Oxford, who went to Loretto School, and Mr. T. H. Black, who joined the Army as a gunner. As the latter took the first place in Honours in the Examinations for each of three University degrees, and gained two fellowships and several scholarships for mathematics, law, and constitutional history, he must

be one of the not very small number of men holding remarkable qualifications who to-day are to be found in the ranks in various branches of H.M. Forces.

We have welcomed the Rev. G. W. Froggatt, M.A., late Classical Prizeman of Durham University, and Mr. R. Black, M.A., B.Sc., late Lorimer Scholar of Glasgow University, as successors to Mr. Bell and Mr. T. H. Black respectively.

As a substitute during this Term for Mr. J. E. Marshall Hall, Chemistry Master, who has been on an Oil Survey in New Brunswick, the School could not get a man at all suitable, but was fortunate enough to secure Miss Margaret Graham, M.Sc., a thoroughly capable Science Mistress. For many years the School has had no mistress on the Staff. This fact, however, has not prevented Miss Graham from doing capital work with the boys, and exerting among them a very good influence.

The increased number of pupils making an addition to the Staff a necessity, the Rev. J. McCrum, B.A., LL.D., was appointed a Master, and is very efficient.

Indeed, it is a matter for satisfaction that, during the past twelve or fifteen months, when many Schools have found it increasingly difficult to get good masters to fill vacancies, Bede School has been able to engage several men who are serving it well. During this period there have been appointed, besides those already named, the Rev. H. C. Perrott, M.A., St. Edmund's Hall, Oxford; the Rev. W. Claud Howard Davies, B.A., B.D., Bles Scholar, Manchester University; and Mr. J. E. Davies, B.A., Powis Exhibitioner and Meyrick Exhibitioner, Jesus College, Oxford.

The young boys who have the benefit of Mr. J. E. Davies's sound and wholesome teaching and training, and who perhaps have noticed that rheumatism sometimes hampers his movements, will be surprised to learn that, at Oxford, long ago, he was a crack cross-country runner!

The boys who hear Dr. McCrum's fine voice will not be surprised that, in past years, he gained more than one Gold Medal for elocution.

BEDE SCHOOL DEBATING SOCIETY. THE CUP DEBATE.

Last night, at the 328th meeting of the Bede School Debating Society, the 18th half-yearly competition for the Airy Challenge Cup took place. Mr. Arnold Cairns ably presided over a large gathering, which included four masters, Messrs. Witter, Ward, J. E. Davies, and Black. One cause of the society's long continued activity and success has been the wisdom usually shown by the committee in choosing "live," interesting subjects for discussion. On this occasion the motion, which had been selected some weeks before Lord Lansdowne wrote his much-talked-of letter, was "That this house dissents from Benjamin Franklin's dictum, 'There never was a good war or a bad peace.'" This was carried by a large majority, there being only four dissentients.

Mr. Cairns and Mr. J. Hindmarch spoke as non-competitors. There were seven cup candidates, Messrs. R. S. Allan, P. P. Jones, T. W. J. Powell, J. T. Robson, S. Cohen, A. Baird, and A. Ryan. The speeches of Mr. Allan for and Mr. Jones against the motion had exceptional merit with regard to matter, language, illustrations, style, and effectiveness, and other speakers made some good points. One boy depicted in striking colours the carnage of the battlefield, and used aptly Shakspeare's fine phrase, "The purple testament of bleeding war." He deplored, too, the destruction of works of art which often occurs during hostilities. But another boy quoted Ruskin to prove that it is only the nations which have taken part in great wars which have produced great art and great literature.

It was shown that the Peace of Aix-la-Chapelle and the Peace of Amiens were thoroughly unsatisfactory and inconclusive, and that the peace which ended the Franco-German War, since it created the Alsace-Lorraine difficulty, was one main cause of the present world-conflict. The Civil War between Charles and Cromwell, which overthrew kingly autocracy in England, and the American Civil War, which abolished slavery, were named as wars beneficial in their results. One boy said wars were like serious surgical operations—always painful, sometimes resulting in death, but often the very means of giving life and health; and another youthful speaker thought that war must surely be necessary at times seeing that God Himself and His hosts once fought against Satan and his angels. It was also pointed out that Franklin strongly supported the American War of Independence, and that he once said: "They that can give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserve neither safety nor liberty."

The headmaster adjudicated, and awarded the cup to Mr. Allan, who was loudly applauded when it was presented to him by Mrs. Ferguson.

Numerous past members of the society have been killed in action during the present war, and three past winners of the cup, Lieutenant T. W. Hetherington, Sergeant A. Eggleston, and Captain and Adjutant F. Wayman, M.C.

THE POTATO PATCH.

Though we were rather late, last Spring, in thinking of having a School Potato Plot, the whole business relating thereto has resulted in success.

The Low Barnes site bought for the new Bede Boys' School, which cannot be built until after the War, is for the most part in the occupation of a farmer and a market-gardener; but a bit of it was not taken up, and the School secured this last April.

This allotment was a long way from our present premises, the wintry weather last Easter prevented the carrying out of some work that had been designed for the vacation at that time, and other obstacles and difficulties came in the way. However, we got the ground dug, and eventually planted 12½ stones of seed-potatoes.

The yield proved most satisfactory. It consisted of 208 stones of potatoes. Grown mainly under trees, not a few of them were rather small; but all had a thin skin, a good colour, and perfect soundness. At a shilling a stone they went "like hot cakes" among the boys, who were ready to buy a much larger stock.

Of the profit, amounting to about £8, £4 was given to the D.L.I. Prisoners of War Fund, and £4 to the Mayor's Fund for providing Christmas gifts for Locally-raised Units.

Several of the Masters did something for the good of the Patch. Mr. Willis, however, was simply indefatigable, and to him and Mr. Hawkins is due the main credit of the gratifying results just stated. Many boys worked hard, and their energies were guided and directed by foresight, good management, and good humour.

We have hopes of getting an additional portion of the site into our hands for cultivation next year. Should our expectations in this matter be fulfilled, we shall need and gladly make use of all the forty boy-volunteers who have already given in their names to Mr. Willis as school-gardeners. Indeed, a still bigger band of young horticulturists will easily find employment.

UNIVERSITY EXTENSION LECTURES.

These lectures, given in the Subscription Library Lecture Hall, Fawcett Street, Sunderland, on Monday evenings, from 8 to 9, are generally both instructive and enjoyable. It is quite natural, therefore, that for many years past the audience has often contained rather numerous representatives of Bede School.

Last Monday, Dr. Markham Lee concluded a delightful Course of lectures on Music.

We beg leave to draw the particular attention of our readers, whether boys, masters, or parents, to the Course of Eleven Lectures on "Gothic Architecture at Home and Abroad," which will begin on Monday, Jan. 14th next, and will be given by the Rev. D. H. S. Cranage, Litt.D., F.S.A., of King's College, Cambridge. Dr. Cranage is the Secretary for the Lectures Syndicate of the University of Cambridge. As a distinguished authority on Art and Architecture, a traveller, an excellent lecturer, and a man of wide experience and charming personality, he may be safely depended upon to make his splendid subject a matter of entrancing interest to his hearers. His exposition, the fine slides of noble buildings in England, France, Italy, Spain, Holland, and Belgium in his collection of illustrations, and the historical associations of most of those edifices, never fail in their appeal.

At this time, when there is a shortage of lecturers owing to many being engaged on war work, the Sunderland Centre regards it as both a kindness and a compliment that Dr. Cranage has agreed to take this Course himself.

THE TWO NEW ALDERMEN.

Both the gentlemen recently appointed Aldermen of Sunderland have, to their credit, long periods of public service, not the least important part of which is their many years' work on the Governing Body of Bede School.

Ald. New is doubtless best known as the Chairman of the Corporation Tramways Committee; but his labours as such, as a magistrate, as a member of the Local Tribunal, and in other capacities, have not prevented him from being an active, efficient Governor of Bede School; and the ability, sound sense, fair-mindedness, and decision of character which have won him the general respect of his fellow-townsmen, are not more obvious than his goodwill towards education. The School is therefore very sorry that his becoming an Alderman happens to involve his ceasing to be a Governor.

Though Ald. Gordon Bell has many interests and great energy, his activities in Council matters have been mainly directed to the furtherance of sanitation and the improvement of higher education. For each of these objects his knowledge, zeal, intellectual power, and capacity for affairs have enabled him to do constructive work both valuable and enduring. The adoption of the measures which, many years ago, he advocated in the Health Committee, have enormously diminished typhoid in Sunderland. It is, however, as Chairman of the Higher Education Sub-Committee that, municipally, he will be best remembered; and, with regard to Bede School, he has always played a most prominent part.

The School congratulates Ald. New and Ald. Bell, and hopes that they may live long to enjoy and exercise their lately-acquired, well-deserved dignity.

THE LATE COUN. J. W. JOHNSON.

It was on Dec. 17th, 1915, that this former Chairman of the Governors of Bede School was killed in a railway accident.

OLD BEDAN SAILORS TORPEDOED.

Besides Old Boys in the Army or the Navy, Old Boys in the mercantile marine (especially those serving on ships acting as transports or carrying Government stores) have had, since 1914, to face war perils.

Charles Lord Bradley, 34, son of Mr. Thos. Bradley, 41, Ellers Rd., Roundhay Rd., Leeds,

formerly of Amberley Street, Sunderland, lost his life near the Scilly Islands, on March 18th last, when the large steamer of which he was chief engineer was torpedoed, only three men surviving. He had a successful career at the School for six years, and left in 1898.

Samuel Worthington Wilson, 16, son of Capt. S. W. Wilson, of Liverpool, formerly of Azalea Avenue, Sunderland, a boy whose brother, L.-Sgt. W. W. Wilson, fell in France, on July 1, '16, went down in May, '17, the ship in which he was an apprentice having been torpedoed. He was at the School from '11 to '16.

Alan Harwood Thatcher, 21, son of Mr. J. Thatcher, 5, Spark Terr., Sunderland, an engineer on a steamer which sailed from the Tyne on Nov. 16, '16, was never heard of again. He left the School in '11, after having been a pupil three years.

We mourn these gallant sailors (and other Old Bedans who have died a like death), and sympathise with the bereaved relatives.

Fortunately, some men and boys from torpedoed ships escape with their lives. We have heard of numerous instances where Old Bedans were concerned. George D. Gaine, of East Boldon, whose brother Cyril is now at the School, and whose father, Capt. Gaine, was lost at sea in Oct., '16, was, in June last, torpedoed two days after leaving port on his first voyage as an apprentice, and received £5 from the owners "for excellent behaviour under very trying circumstances." Since then he has undergone shipwreck in another vessel, and is still very much alive! Sept. 13th last was his 15th birthday.

EXAMINATION RESULTS.

The last Oxford Local Lists, though very satisfactory in the main, call for no special comment. But the June London Matriculation results were really excellent. The School highly appreciated a kind and congratulatory letter which it received from Ald. J. S. Nicholson, Chairman of the Governors, who alluded to the fact that Bede School had on this occasion got more "Firsts" than any other School or College.

SPEECH DAY.

Speech Day will be held early next Term, in the Subscription Library Hall, on a date not yet fixed. Ald. Nicholson will preside, and His Worship the Mayor is to be asked to present the Certificates.

We regret that it will not be possible to invite parents to the ceremony, as the space available is barely sufficient for the School and the Governors.

Many people connected with Bede School were in the audience which filled the Subscription Library Hall to its utmost extent, on Dec. 4th, when Mrs. Howard Davies, L.R.A.M., wife of the Rev. C. Howard Davies, gave a delightful Recital. Mrs. Davies deserves congratulation on what was not simply a success, but a triumph.

On Nov. 30th, Form III. had a little Concert, for getting up which Eric Purvis was mainly responsible.

The re-asphalting of part of the playground, done during the Midsummer Holidays, was a very satisfactory job; and so was the painting and decorating of the class-rooms.

The temporary building remains incorrigibly leaky. Under ordinary conditions it lets in less rain than of yore; but, when anything like a driving storm occurs, the ventilators admit water pretty freely. The boys underneath make few complaints. A little rueful, but quite meek, they glide quietly into some other part of the room less liable to stress of weather.

From a penalty awarded to Bede, Bath scored with a fine ground shot. Other goals were scored by Gunn (2) and Bath, the final score being 5—0 for Bede.

At the beginning of the game, rain was falling in torrents, and there was a strong wind prevalent throughout the match. Despite the bad condition of the weather, there was a good attendance to support the team. The first goal was the result of a fine shot by Bath soon after the game commenced. During the rest of the half the visitors were slightly superior and scored three goals. Soon after the beginning of the second half, Gateshead scored again, but Bede maintained the lead, goals being scored by Bath and Gunn. The final score was 4—2 in favour of Bede.

The District Competition is proving very interesting. Durham Road are, at present, at the head of the list, having so far suffered no defeats, while Hendon hold the bottom place, having lost every match.

Many thanks are due for the interest shown by members of the Staff, especially Mr. Willis, Mr. Grisdale, Mr. Ward, Mr. Black, and Mr. Hooper, who

turned up to see all or most of the games, and also to Mr. Ward and Mr. Black for refereeing some of the matches. It was also very pleasing to see the headmaster, Mr. Ferguson, at the Ryhope match.

In previous years the School has nearly always had a capital goal-keeper—such as J. P. Moffitt, C. W. Pollock, and W. G. Jackson. The fact that the School team did not lose a single match last season was largely due to Jackson's phenomenal skill. This season our goal-keepers have been comparatively inexperienced. Still, the team is improving, and, though somewhat light—especially when pitted against elevens containing student-teachers: a sort of pupil which Bede School excludes, on principle, from its elevens—the players are plucky and will show some good form before very long.

A RONDEAU.
