The NAMES of all OLD BOYS of BEDE SCHOOL (1890-1917)

Who were in any Branch of His Majesty's Military or Naval Forces
During the GREAT WAR which began in 1914.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

A. An attempt has been made to procure information as to the (1) Name, (2) Rank, (3) Regiment, Ship, or other Section of the Army or Navy, and (4) Present Station, of EVERY OLD BOY on military or naval service at any time during the War.

Also, information has been sought with regard to EVERY OLD BOY who, while serving in the War, has (1) Fallen, or (2) Become one of the Missing, or (3) Been Wounded, or (4) Been Taken Prisoner, or (5) Gained Special Distinction.

B. The Roll here given is based upon the materials at present available, and contains the Names of 730 Old Bedans (including several who left School to enlist), of whom 665 are or were in the Army and 65 in the Navy.

An Analysis based on RANK gives the following figures:

- a. ARMY: 179 Officers (1 Major, 27 Captains, 1 Chaplain, 43 Lieutenants, 107 Sec.-Lieutenants), 150 Non-Commissioned Officers (1 Co. Sergt.-Major Instructor, 1 Co. Sgt. Major, 2 Co. Q.M. Sgts., 1 Batty. Q.M. Sgt., 1 Squadron Q.M. Sgt., 4 Staff-Sgts., 4 Q.M. Sgts., 1 Farrier Sgt., 1 Artificer Sgt., 1 Sgt. Instructor, 44 Sgts., 2 Lance-Sgts., 30 Corporals, 42 Lance-Corporals, 14 Bombardiers, 1 Drill Instructor).
- 306 Men (204 Privates, 5 Riflemen, 46 Gunners, 11 Drivers, 12 Troopers, 1 Pioneer, 20 Sappers, 3 Telegraphists, 1 First Air Mechanic, 2 Second Air Mechanics, 1 Trumpeter).
- 30 Cadets (1 Gentleman Cadet, Royal Military College, Woolwich; 29 Cadets—including some men who have seen active service—in O.T. Corps).
- b. NAVY: 32 Officers (9 Lieutenants, 5 Eng.-Lieuts., 1 Lieut.-Gunner, 1 Navigating Officer, 2 Naval Instrs., 7 Sub-Lieuts., 5 Eng.-Sub-Lieuts., 1 Chief Eng., 1 Sec.-Engineer).
- 22 Warrant or Petty Officers, Men and Boys (1 Warrant Eng., 1 Eng. Instructor, 1 Chief E.R.A., 12 E.R. Artificers, 2 Signalmen, 1 Gunner, 2 Wireless Operators, 2 Writers, 1 Able Seaman, 4 Ordinary Seamen, 1 Man in Armourer's Crew, 1 Cook's Mate, 1 Stoker, 3 First-Class Boys).

[At the foot of the Roll appear the Names of 7 Bede School Masters (1 Killed in action) belonging to the Army. Not being Old Boys of the School, they are not included in the foregoing Analysis; but the Clerk, an Old Boy serving, is so included. Also, the Names of 6 Masters who Attested under Lord Derby's Scheme, are shown at the foot of the Roll. One of these is an Examiner in the A.I.D. Another is about to be posted.]

- c. Summary of CASUALTIES.—Killed in action or Died of wounds, 58; Died while serving, 2; Missing, 6; Wounded, Gassed, or Shell-Shocked, 100; Prisoners of War, 6; Total, 172.
- d. Summary of DECORATIONS and DISTINCTIONS.—Military Cross, 11; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 2; Military Medal, 5; Cross of Chevalier of Legion of Honour, 1; Mentioned in Despatches, 5; Total, 24.

E. PLACE OF STATION of Men still serving.—British Isles, 264 (including Wounded and Invalided); British Overseas Dominions (chiefly India and Egypt), 33; At Sea, 55; Salonika, 15; Mesopotamia, 10; Germany, 6; France and Flanders, 289. Total 672.
[N.B. 58 have been killed.]

Of the men shown as being in the British Isles, not a few, probably, are already abroad, and many others are certain to go abroad before long.

F. The figures placed after each Old Boy's Name in the Roll show the year of his leaving the School.

G. The GROWTH of the Roll has been steady. Here are the Dates when the different Drafts were printed, and the Number of Names in each Draft:—1st, Dec., '14, 180; 2nd, March, '15, 240; 3rd, July, '15, 320; 4th, Dec., '15, 440; 5th, April, '16, 515; 6th, July, '16, 570; 7th, Dec., '16, 627; 8th, July, '17, 730.

H. Though hundreds of hours have been willingly and gladly devoted to the collection and arrangement of particulars, the Roll is probably incorrect in places, and is without doubt very incomplete. It will be augmented and amended from time to time as additional information is received, and will be published afresh in each Number of *The Bedan* which appears during the War. My colleague Mr. (now Gunner) T. H. Blyth assisted me to compile the earlier Drafts. Mr. J. H. Smith-white has helped with the last three.

Readers will observe that the present Draft, unlike the earlier ones, fails to specify the battalion or battery to which a man belongs, and leaves out nearly all exact details about him. The omissions have been made deliberately, to comply with a widely-issued War Office Notice, the aim of which is to prevent the Inadvertent Disclosure of Military Information in periodicals, rolls of honour, reports of war work, and similar publications.

But a Record is kept at the School of such things as an Old Boy's battalion, his address, etc.—though, of course, it will not be printed until it can be published freely.

I particularly beg that anybody who notices anything erroneous or out-of-date in the Roll, or any name omitted which ought certainly to appear, will kindly write to me about the matter. Often a few lines on a post-card will suffice.

The whole SCHOOL is most grateful to Old Boys who support in arms the cause of King and Country, and also to their parents and friends. We are wishful and eager, as has already been indicated, to have a full list of those Old Boys' names. We shall watch, with pride, interest, sympathy, and affection, the careers of all Old Bedans taking part in the War; and we shall ever remember with special gratitude *the men who fall*. We hope and pray that, by making the supreme sacrifice, they may gain an even better reward than grateful remembrance. "Whosoever shall lose his life shall preserve it" (Luke xvii, 33); and an Old Bedan who dies in battle for the right may perhaps then first realise the full significance of his school motto *Post Tenebras Lux: After Darkness, Light*.

BEDS SCHOOL DEBATING SOCIETY.

CUP DEBATE.

Last night, at the 312th meeting of the society, the 17th half-yearly debate for the Airy Challenge Cup took place, the house being asked (and refusing by a small majority) to assent to the metaphorical epigram "Facts are the dross of history." Officers and past cup-winners are precluded from competing for the cup, and, as the subject was a difficult one for young boys, there were only three candidates, John Hindmarch,

Sebag Cohen, and Jno. T. Robson. Hindmarch, who was agreeable in voice and manner and used good language throughout a sustained argument, received the award.

There was a very keen contest for Mrs Ferguson's prize for officers and senior members. The five candidates, Marcus Lipton, Maurice Share, (president), Arnold Cairns, Norman Cooke, and Ronald Keenlyside, all happen to have gained first-class honours in the Oxford Locals, and to be able to state a case with ability and effect. Their speeches were very unlike one another, and all showed research and ingenuity, abounded in apt illustrations, and had solid merits. Among the many authorities quoted were Thucydides, who defined history as "philosophy teaching by examples"; and Gibbon, who said somewhat cynically that history is "little more than the register of the crimes, follies, and misfortunes of mankind."

Keenlyside skilfully detached Wordsworth's phrase "Little, nameless, unremembered acts" from its context, and said that these, in history as in a man's life, are really more important than the great deeds in which they sometimes culminate. On the same lines Lipton contended that historical facts merely characterise inward motives, are subsidiary to the principles of general progress, and simply indicate the decisive moments in a nation's development. His speech was perhaps the best-balanced, and he obtained the prize. Messrs. Ward, Bell, and Engvall took part in the discussion as non-competitors, the first-named indicating with great power and lucidity just what the epigram meant. The headmaster adjudicated, and also, in the absence of Mrs. Ferguson owing to illness, presented the cup and the prize to the winners.

BEDE COLLEGIATE SCHOOL.

BOY'S BRILLIANT SUCCESS.

James Alexander Petch, son of Mr. Daniel Petch, storekeeper, Messrs. Austin's shipyard, 12 Sydenham Terrace, Sunderland, was yesterday elected by the Master (Bishop Mitchinson) and the Fellows of Pembroke College, Oxford, to an Open Major Classical Scholarship, the Cleobury Scholarship of £100 a year, tenable at that college. There were 60 candidates for four scholarships, of which the Cleobury is the most valuable, and the age-limit was 19 years.

Petch is 16 years and 11 months old. He has been at Bede School since 1910, when he gained an exhibition. He passed the Oxford Junior Local Examination with third-class honours in 1914, the Oxford Senior with first-class honours in 1915, and the London Matriculation Examina-

tion in the first division in June, 1916. He is a School Prefect and a Games Prefect and a past president of the Debating Society. His present examination success is perhaps, all things considered, the most brilliant ever achieved by a Bede School boy, and will gain the school a whole holiday on Wednesday.

Subsequent information shows that, as a matter of fact, five Scholarships were awarded—two of £100, one of £90, and two of £80.

We heartily congratulate Petch on what is a really notable performance. Most Open Scholarships in *Classics* at Oxford or Cambridge naturally go to boys from the old-established Grammar Schools. Petch's success in *Classics* is therefore particularly praiseworthy.

Mr. Hogben, the Senior Classical Master at Bede School, deserves congratulation. Four boys gained *Distinction* in Greek in the Oxfrd. Sen. Loc. Examn. last July. Then Forbes, last November, gained in Latin and Greek a Drapers' Company's Scholarship and an Exhibition at Emmanuel College, Cambridge. Now Petch "has come along".

Pembroke can boast of several distinguished old alumni—Dr. Samuel Johnson (the subject of the best biography in the English language), the poet Shenstone, and Camden the great antiquary.

Petch has a fine disposition and plenty of good sense, and is held in general respect at School. We hope and believe that he will do well at College.

EXAMINATIONS.

A good many Tests and Trials came in the last few weeks of the Summer Term.

The Examination, held on May 24th and 25th, for Exhibitions tenable in the School, attracted an unusually large number of Candidates; and so did the General Entrance Examination, held on June 27th, for boys desiring admission in the Autumn Term.

The Oral French and Oral German Examinations were conducted by Prof. Latham, on June 6th, 7th, and 8th.

The London Matriculation Examn. lasted from June 11th to June 14th. Of the 14 boys in the Lower Sixth, 3 who were under 16 years of age were precluded by the Regulations from being Candidates. The remaining 11 "sat".

The General Oxford Local Examinations began on Thursday, July 12th, and went on until Saturday, July 21st. All the 60 boys in the Lower Fifth, whether good, bad, or indifferent, presented themselves according to rule at the Junior, and, similarly, all the 26 boys in the Upper Fifth, at the Senior Examination.

THE MUSIC INSPECTION.

Dr. Arthur Somervell, the Board of Education Inspector of Music, spent nearly the whole of Monday, July 2nd, at the School. In giving notice of his visit "to inspect the instruction in Music at the School" the Board stated "It is desired that the whole musical activities of the School, instrumental as well as vocal, shall come under review."

A complete Scheme of all the Teaching of Music done at the School, indicating the objects aimed at and also the methods used and the scope of the instruction, was presented to the Inspector, and he heard most of the Forms sing separately. Among the dozens of songs sung—most of them classical—were Greeting, Creation's Hymn, The Wandering Miller, Verdant Meadows, The Lass of Richmond Hill, My Mother bids me bind my hair, Hear thou my weeping, Wander Thirst, Who is Sylvia, Where the bee sucks, O Star of Eve, The Two Grenadiers, Where'er you walk, Gentle Zephyr, The Forge, It was a lover and his lass, O Sunny beam, The Crusaders, and Say ye who borrow.

Afterwards, as there is not in the premises an Assembly Hall or any other room designed for the accommodation ordinarily of more than 30 boys, the Choir of about 170 boys selected from the whole School just swarmed into Room 22 (where Mr. Jarman usually takes the music lessons) and assumed "close order". Some adventurous spirits poised themselves on window-sills, the top of the porch, and the top of the big cupboard. When all had got a seat or a foothold somewhere—and it was wonderful how soon the necessary acrobatic preliminaries were gone through—the boys sang Let the bright Seraphim, Full fathom five, and the folk song "I'll sing you one, oh", in a way which we think the Inspector liked.

Some allusion was made to the doings of the School Orchestra, and to Rupert Lee's success in winning an Open Scholarship in Music at Jesus College, Oxford.

It is five years since Dr. Somervell's previous visit to the School. The boys seem to enjoy the Music Inspections. Mrs. Ferguson was present at the latest one.

MUMPS.

In the Spring Term, the School had the nearest approach to anything like an epidemic which it has ever experienced. Since the Opening Day, April 28th, 1890, the number of boys absent together at any one time on account of infectious disease has, happily, throughout long periods, very often been a cipher, or one, or two; and, to the best of our recollection, before the year 1917 it rose to ten or twelve only once or twice. But, one week in March this year, we had four boys absent owing to measles and *nineteen* owing to mumps! Even in *that* week the attendance was not appallingly bad, for slightly more than 90 per cent of the 424 boys on the rolls were always at school. But, of course, in an ordinary Term, the average attendance seldom represents less than 95 per cent of all the pupils, and often rises to a percentage of 97 or 98.

It is hardly necessary to add—the fact being notorious—that Bede School was by no means the only community in Sunderland which, in the early months of the year, suffered from mumps. For a few weeks this very disagreeable ailment seemed to be rife in the town.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Though twice as large as in pre-War days, *The Bedan* is still far too small for the "copy" available. In this Number we find ourselves left with hardly sufficient room for even the bare mention of several topics to certain of which, at least, we had intended to refer at some length. We hope to say more about them in our next issue. The School Potato Plots are likely to prove a success—a result due to the skilful direction and untiring zeal of Mr. Willis and Mr. Hawkins, and the co-operation of many boys and masters. Staff changes go on. With regret we lost Mr. Wills at Easter and Mr. Engvall in June, and shall lose Mr. Bell and Mr. Black at the Midsummer Holidays. Mr. Wills is now an Examiner in the Aeronautical Inspection Dept., and Mr. Bell is going as a Master to a famous Scottish school, Loretto. The Rev. H. C. Perrott and the Rev. C. Howard Davies have been welcomed as new masters. Mr. Clement has been away for three weeks, unwell; but we hope to see him again in September, in good health. During his absence the Rev. E. Jackson has had his Form. Next Term Mr. Marshall Hall will be in New Brunswick, taking part in an Oil Survey: a substitute-master will act for him while he is away. The School lost a staunch supporter when Mr. James Macnair died: his four sons and his daughter are Old Bedans. Recently, Edward Bowden qualified for the degree of Doctor of Science of Durham University; and Reginald Hunter graduated M.B., B.S., with Honours, at Durham Univ. Coll. of Medicine, Newcastle, and also took the diplomas of M.R.C.S and L.R.C.P. in London. Old Boys' visits and letters to the School have of late

been unusually frequent: they always give pleasure. Only four students passed the Examination held after the last University Extension Lecture Course at Sunderland: two of them were Bede boys, Forbes and Share. The General Knowledge Paper in the December *Bedan* seems to have interested a very wide circle of readers: we have even been urged to let the Magazine contain such a Paper *invariably*!



SWIMMING.

THE practices of the School Swimming Club commenced on Thursday, April 26th, and have continued throughout this Term. The number in attendance is considerably lower than the average for the corresponding Term last season, being 56.5 (although we have never yet seen the '5 of a boy!) compared with about 70.

Those boys who do come to the Baths are fairly keen, and much interest has been aroused by the Shield Competitions. It is impossible to give details, of course, but the following statistics may suffice:—

Senior Shield.—L. V (1) 84%; VI 70.3%; L. V (2) 64%; U. V 10%.

Junior Shield.—U. IV (1) 81%; U. IV (3) 57.2%; L. IV (2) 46.4%; L. IV (4) 27.5%; U. IV (2) 12%; L. IV (1) 5.5%; L. IV (3) 3.8%.

Many of these percentages are extremely small. We hope the Forms who have small percentages will try to raise them next season.

We are greatly indebted to Mr. Witter for his unfailing support and help in the practices. We should like to thank Mr. Black also for his kindness in judging the diving competitions.

Now, finally, we should like to see more enthusiasm on the part of the Upper Forms. If the Sixth and Upper Fifth think it their duty "as members of the Sixth" (or Upper Fifth, as the case may be) to attend the School Football and Cricket Matches, should they not attend the Swimming Practices too either as swimmers or as spectators? A few years ago these Forms made a point of attending the practices. So turn up, you Seniors, and set an example to younger boys. We are sure that the time will not be ill-spent, for swimming is one of the healthiest and at the same time one of the most spectacular of our English sports.

Besides, in these days of submarines and torpedoes, surely it is plainer than ever that every boy who has the chance of learning to swim should seize that opportunity. Perhaps a time may come when he will be glad to seize anything!

SPEECH DAY, 1917.

THOUGH held on a restricted scale, in the absence of parents and friends, and devoid of all spectacular elements, the ceremony on Friday afternoon, March 23rd, was yet very successful. Things went smoothly. All the speeches were good, and were listened to with acceptance. As usual on these occasions, the singing reached a high order of excellence: the selected boys who sang "Let the bright seraphim" and "Full fathom five" numbered about one hundred and twenty, and some of their notes were thrilling.

Ald. J. S. Nicholson, who presided, had been appointed Chairman of the Governors just the day before. The fact that the new Mayor accompanied him pleased the boys, and everybody associated with the School, very much indeed.

The Headmaster said at the outset :—

" Mr. Chairman, Ladies, Gentlemen, and Boys,

I am sure that the School desires to give you, Sir, a most hearty welcome on your becoming Chairman of the Governors. After the lamented death, in December, 1915, of Councillor Johnson, who had been Chairman for several years and a staunch friend of the School always, we were very glad that his successor in the Chair was Ald. Gibson, now the Senior Member of the Council. Ald. Gibson has taken a warm interest in the School, and we greatly regret that the claims of his business, and his son's ill-health, have induced him to give up the Chairmanship. We rejoice that Ald. Gibson has been succeeded by a gentleman who, like himself, has had exceptional experience in educational administration ; and we wish you, Sir, a long and happy term of office.

In common with every other society in Sunderland, Bede School mourns the death of the late Mayor : he was one of the Governors.

The School takes it as a great honour, and feels highly delighted, that the new Mayor has favoured our Speech Day with his presence. Ald. Vint has long been an active member of the Governing Body ; but we think it particularly kind of him to give us some of his valuable time to-day, immediately after entering upon his new duties. We wish his Worship a long and successful Mayoralty."

The following report appeared in the *Echo*, on Saturday, March 24th :—

For various reasons connected with the war the annual Speech Day in connection with the Bede Collegiate Boys' School, which was held yesterday, took place not in the Victoria Hall, but in the Subscription Library Hall, Fawcett Street. Certificates instead of prizes were awarded to boys who in ordinary circumstances would have been prize-winners. They had been designed by Mr. Hawkins (Art Master), bore the school arms, and were appropriately worded and most pleasing in general effect.

Ald. J. S. Nicholson, the newly-elected Chairman of the Governors, presided, and was supported by Mrs. Nicholson, the Mayor (Alderman W. F. Vint), Alderman Bruce, Mr. A. Corder, and the Headmaster (Mr. G. T. Ferguson). The boys and staff filled the hall. A musical programme consisting mainly of Shakespearean songs was rendered, under Mr. R. F. Jarman's direction, by a choir of boys with voices of great power and fine quality.

The Headmaster's report stated that the school, in spite of some drawbacks due to the war, had

prospered greatly. The Sixth and Upper Fifth Forms were comparatively small last year, and they were still rather less than in pre-war days ; but all the other Forms had grown. Last year the school reached what was then the " record " number of 402 boys. This week the number of boys was 424. The premises were so crowded that in most parts of the school it was impossible to admit another pupil. Staff changes had naturally been somewhat numerous. After several years' service at Bede School, Mr. Auchmuty went recently to Bedford Modern School and Mr. Findlater to Luton Modern School. In June last two other well-known masters, Mr. Blyth and Mr. Hildebrand, and the Clerk of the school (Mr. Wayman), joined the Army. Of the five other masters who had previously gone on military service, namely, Captain White, Captain Joseph, Captain Dodd, Lieutenant Back, and Lieutenant Liebrecht, he regretted to say that one, Captain White, was killed in action in France last summer. They had welcomed the following new masters : The Rev. A. Hooper, Messrs. Black, Davies, Engvall, Marshall-Hall, and Ward, with the drill master (ex Sergeant Fulton, who fought in Gallipoli and lost his arm there), and the Clerk (Mr. Dalton).

The principal recent examination successes of the boys were the following :—Music open scholarship, £60 a year for three years, Jesus College, Oxford, June, 1915 : F. Rupert M. Lee, now private, Artists' Rifles. Mathematical open exhibition, £60 a year for three years, Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, December, 1915 : Joseph Porteus, now rifleman, Rifle Brigade. Drapers' Company's scholarship, £25 a year for three years, also classical exhibition, £40 a year for three years, both tenable at Emmanuel College, Cambridge, November, 1916 : Peter B. R. Forbes. London matriculation, June, 1916 : First division, 3 ; second division, 4. Oxford Local Senior, July, 1916 : Honours, first class, 8 ; second class, 4 ; third class, 4 ; pass, 4 ; excused "responsions" in stated subjects, 4 ; "distinctions," 9 ; Oral French, 8 ; Oral German, 3. This was, on the whole, the most brilliant senior list that the school had ever had. There was also the Oxford Local Junior, July, 1916 : Honours, 1st class, 4 ; 2nd class, 7 ; 3rd class, 8. Pass, 1st division, 22 ; 2nd division, 4. "Distinctions," 6 ; Oral French, 4 ; Oral German, 5.

SPORTS AND SOCIETIES.

The various school games, clubs, and societies continued to flourish. Last season's football team was very successful. Matches played, 9 ; won, 6 ; lost, 1 ; drawn, 2 ; goals for, 31, goals against, 8. Walker, Burnand, and Ayre got 25 of the goals. Jackson was, as usual, splendid in defence. Three enjoyable matches were played against a team of Sherwood Foresters. Much

enthusiasm was shown in the District competition; the winners, with 13 points, were the Roker boys. In cricket, the school team won 2 matches and lost 3, scoring 233 to 214. The bowling of Haswell and Durrant, and Jackson's batting, were noteworthy. Upon one condition Bede School might take the same high place in cricket as in football—there must be steady net practice by the players under a diligent captain, and on a respectable practice wicket. In the matter of swimming the school maintained its fine tradition. Since July, 1914, the boys had gained 209 certificates, medals, etc. School champion, 1916, A. Douglas Smith; junior champion, J. C. Race. R. B. Blair gets a certificate, in lieu of the school silver medal, for swimming, with his clothes on, 20 lengths of the High Street Bath. The boxing club, with nearly 60 members, was doing good though quiet work. It encouraged a sport second to none in promoting the development of the virile virtues of endurance, good temper, and sense of fairplay. Last year's president, F. M. Mackay, and this year's captain and vice-captain, W. V. Hornsby and T. R. Richardson, had all joined the Forces. The debating society was as vigorous as ever. The attendances at the beginning of this session were exceptionally large. President (in succession): Lipton, Share; Sec., Cairns. Cup-winners: Keenlyside, Hindmarch. Freshers' prize, Cohen. Seniors' prize, Lipton. The school orchestra, though depleted by the war, did good work by maintaining the interest of boys who were learning instrumental music. The orchestra last year gave some public performances apart from school functions. A wish was expressed that more boys would take up the study of the 'cello and the contra bass. The school library is used by an ever-increasing number of readers and it does great good.

The arts and crafts society had had many enjoyable and instructive meetings, two exhibitions, a concert, a play, and six lectures. The "Bedan" was still maintained, in spite of the increased cost of paper and printing.

Among the school's benefactions was a gift of £12 14s. 0d. in January to the Commission for the Relief of Belgian Children. This week the school had literally "broken new ground" by beginning to cultivate two plots on the Low Barnes Estate. The boys expect that their work will yield them great satisfaction and many potatoes.

THE WAR LIST.

The war list of Old Bedans, though believed to be very incomplete, now contained 650 names; 600 Old Boys were in the Army, and 50 in the Navy. Of these, 184 were officers and 130 N.C.O.'s. Forty-four "Old Boys" had been killed in action, 84 wounded, and 6 taken prisoners. Two had died while serving, and two

were missing. Six had gained the Military Cross, two the Military Medal, one the D.C.M., and one the Cross of a Chevalier of the Legion of Honour. Four have been mentioned in despatches. The school proudly mourned "Old Boys" who had fallen; condoled with relatives bereaved; sympathized with the wounded and the captive, and was grateful to all Bedans, dead or living, who had fought for their country.

The headmaster thanked the Governors for their support, the staff for their loyalty and co-operation, the parents for their goodwill and ready help, and the boys for their cheerfulness and earnest work.

THE SPEECHES.

The Mayor, who was greeted with great cheering, expressed thanks for the warmth of his reception, spoke most appreciatively of his predecessor, and said he was glad to be present to support Ald. Nicholson (who, like him, was taking up new and important work), and also to show his continued interest in Bede School. Moving the adoption of the headmaster's report, he said he had often had occasion, in the Education Committee and the Council, to refer to the school's good work. His Worship then addressed to the boys a few stimulating words, urging them in particular never to do anything to lessen the general reputation of Englishmen for trustworthiness and integrity.

Mr. Corder seconded, and said that seeing the bright faces of the boys made him feel twenty years younger. The report showed that his hearers had "played the game" hitherto. He hoped they would do so all through life.

Ald. Nicholson was cordially cheered, and, having presented the certificates, complimented the headmaster, the staff, and the boys on an excellent year's work accomplished under great difficulties. The school's strength and vitality were remarkable. Some people had thought that the withdrawal of the Durham County pupils in 1911 would mean depleted numbers for a very long time, but the loss was soon made up, and the school was now full to overflowing. In the current financial year increased fees and economical management had made the school cost the rates £400 less than was provided for in the estimates. He thought the boys' singing delightful, and the record of their successes and activities even more delightful. All parties concerned were to be congratulated. Referring to the new tasks and obligations imposed upon everybody by the war, he exhorted the boys to meet the claims of duty, and, in conclusion, quoted some lines on that subject from Tennyson's "Ode on Wellington."

Ald. Bruce proposed a vote of thanks to the Chairman. This was heartily accorded, and the singing of the National Anthem ended the proceedings.

CRICKET CHARACTERS.

Durrant (Capt.)—The task of the Captain of a team which is unable to obtain regular batting practice is no enviable one, and although—through no fault of his own—"Derry" has only once so far had a captain's pleasure in leading his team to victory, yet he has always set his men a splendid example by his keen, sportsmanlike spirit, and, bowling with untiring persistence, has proved the mainstay of the attack, his success against Ryhope School in particular, when he took 8 wickets for 5 runs, being extraordinary.

Jackson (V.-Capt.)—Was unfortunately unable, owing to illness, to play in the first four matches. A safe wicket-keeper and a hard-hitting batsman.

King—A good medium-paced bowler, but rather erratic at times. His batting shows an improvement on last season. He is still a hard hitter.

Petch—A careful batsman, but, in fielding, rather slow. Would improve with practice.

Wayman—Noteworthy as a smart fielder. He has not been successful with the bat, but would do better if he tried more off strokes, instead of the leg stroke which he attempts often when he should clearly play forward or to the off.

Wiseman—From his form as a batsman early in the Term much was expected of him, but unfortunately he has been rather disappointing, and his batting has distinctly fallen off. On the other hand, however, he is a safe fielder and a good catch.

Clark—Has bowled well as a change bowler, but as a batsman he has been unsuccessful. A bad off stroke is perhaps responsible for this.

Gibbins—Has been responsible for some smart fielding at cover-point. Since the first match his batting has improved considerably, yet he still needs practice, and is rather inclined to raise the ball.

Henry—Unfortunately, before the first match he was little known as a cricketer, but has since proved one of the steadiest bats in the team. His weak point is his fielding: he must throw in harder and catch better.

Manners—A good, stylish bat, and top of the averages. He is the only one who has shown anything like good form as a batsman. Also, during Jackson's absence, he played excellently in the hard position of wicket-keeper.

Pool—An excellent fielder in the slips and a fair bat.

Strother—Was included in the team during Jackson's absence. A fair bat but a poor fieldman.

Ayre (reserve)—A very good fielder at point but a poor bat. He needs plenty of practice.
