INFORMATION FOR MEMBERS

Annual Subscription: 2½/- due on September 1st.

Life Subscription: £2/2½/- if paid within two years; otherwise £2/12/6.

Associate Subscription: 1/- for girls of Form Upper VI.

Annual Subscriptions count towards Life Membership. Anyone who has paid one half-crown subscription becomes a Life Member by a further payment of £1/19/6 before the end of her second year's membership. After that time, the total of the payments made must be £2/12/6, e.g., a member who has paid ten annual subscriptions becomes a Life Member by a further payment of £1/7/6. If however, membership is allowed to lapse, payments must be begun anew.

Membership. On August 31st, the membership was 378, including 120 Life Members. There were only fifteen new members, and 52 subscriptions for 1948-49 and 125 for 1949-50 are still unpaid.

IN MEMORIAM — MISS M. G. WILSON

With the passing of Miss M. G. Wilson, last May, a link was severed in the chain which binds the Old Higher Grade School to the new Bede Grammar School. Miss Wilson came to the school as a pupil and, after graduating at Durham University, she returned to it as a member of the staff; all her teaching days were spent as a Bedan.

Soon after retirement, she went to live at Cotherstone and looked forward to having many happy days there. The war came, and her house, like many another, was filled with evacuees. Then ill-health overtook her, and, for the last four years of her life, she was practically an invalid, nursed devotedly by her two sisters.

What memories of M.G.W. remain? Some of us remember her as a staunch friend and loyal colleague; some as a proxy of the Silver Linings Society and school charities; some as an able and patient teacher of History and Latin, some as a kind and often indulgent form-mistress; a teller of original ghost stories, "to be continued on our next wet games day"; some as the universal provider of chocolate biscuits before the advent of packets and ration books; some of us loved her. Everyone of us—every Bedan, who was privileged to know M.G.W.—knows what the School has lost by her death.

THE BRIDE CIRCLE

This was the first society of Old Bedans. In the absence of the original record book it is not possible to make other than a general statement about it. Its founder, who also named it, was Gretchen Körner. Miss Janet Todd, Headmistress of the School, was its Patroness. It began possibly in 1906 and meetings were held in a room in the old Y.M.C.A. building, opposite the Library and Museum.

Meetings were of a varied nature: sometimes addresses, sometimes talks on books, sometimes music, sometimes sewing or handicraft. Miss Davison (Mrs. Kirkby) spoke once of her South African experiences and Miss Abraham (Mrs. Joseph) spoke on teaching in South Africa.

There were regular attenders and many Old Bedans who appeared from time to time. Some remembered names may be of interest—Constance Johnson (Mrs. Gaither); Mabel Johnson (Mrs. Barnister); Helen Jeff (Mrs.); Stella Balles; Norah March; Lily Wright; Marion Morrison; Dr. Elisabeth Niel; Kate Burnett; Mary Burnett; Muriel Watson (Mrs. Pain).

Later the Circle became merged in an Old Bedan Girls' Association, founded in 1909, becoming in 1928 the modern "Guild of Old Bedans."
