There are 449 members in the Guild of which 4 have become life members. There are 6 new members, 3 of whom are life members.

There have been 3 committee meetings and 4 re-unions during the year.

The A.G.M. was held on 27th September, 1985 in the Needlework Room at Bede School. The new Chairman, Kathleen Bolton, took over from Margaret Hunter and Jeanne Francis became Vice Chairman. The programme for the year was discussed.

The Winter Re-union was also held in the Needlework Room on 31st January, 1986. The refreshments were supplied by Joan Harvey of "Something Special". Crockery etc. was supplied and everyone agreed it was very good. 73 attended and Robina Lawson kept everyone busy with various games. The raffle was once again for Guild Funds and the proceeds helped towards the cost of the magazine. Thank you everyone who contributed so generously and to all who helped to make this an enjoyable evening.

The Annual Dinner was in the Hilton Suite at the Seaburn Hotel on Friday, April 25th. We were pleased to welcome Old Bedans from out of town and 77 attended. Miss M. Dunn entertained us once again and it was good to hear Old Bedans laughter.

The Summer re-union was at the Barnside Hotel on Tuesday, June 10th, 1986 in the Pemberton Room. Again the number present had increased - 38 this year. This informal re-union is proving popular - but we did not expect the musical accompaniment. We hope to do something about this for 1987!

The Guild were represented at the Annual Prize giving in December at the invitation of the headmaster, Mr. Tait. Mrs. R. Bolton, Miss J. Hayton and Miss I. Wilkinson attended and presented the Old Bede prize and the Connie Wray cup.

#### LOAN & SCHOLARSHIP FUND REPORT - 1985

A total of £298.00 was available. £222.00 was distributed to 17 girls going into Higher Education, the scholarships being awarded on a scale according to 'A' level performance from £40 - £8.

One additional award of £20 was made to a girl who had delayed entry to higher education from the previous year.

Two of the recipients of awards this year were girls who are now at Cambridge, Sadie Lowry at Queen's and Gillian Miller at Jesus reading English and Economics respectively. Both girls obtained very creditable examination results, Sadie's including 3 'A' grades.

#### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The A.G.M. was held on 26th September, 1986 in the Needlework Room at Bede School and 14 were present. Apologies for absence were received from Nell Shiel (Widdrington); Margaret Chapman (Hunter); Win Scott (Thomas); Elsie White (Bailey); Marjorie Snowball (Cuddeford); Pat Cruden (Snell); Jean Bovell (Pillans); Lillian Dawson (Dodds); Nora Johnson (Wilson) and Rose Halliday (Dowse).

The minutes of the previous A.G.M. were read, adopted and signed. The Secretary gave a report on membership and meetings held during the year.

The Treasurer reported a loss on the year's workings and an increase in subscriptions was suggested. It was agreed the Annual subscription be increased to £1 and Life Membership increased to £3. It was also suggested that long-standing Life Members might like to make a donation.

A "Thank you" card from Mrs. Lily Youngs was read. She has resigned as President of the G.O.B. Association in July when she retired as Deputy Head of Bede School.

The new committee members, Lily Richardson (Lawson); and Doreen Staniforth (Stan) were welcomed and the retiring members of the committee were thanked for their help and support.

The Social Services report was given by Anne Mitchell (Crowe) and the Legion Branch report from Doreen Ward (Macrae) was read by the Secretary.

It was agreed the School Prize for 1986 should again be £5.

The programme for the coming year was discussed and dates agreed. The mixture as before was accepted. Dates for these meetings to be put inside the front cover of the magazine.

The meeting closed with tea and biscuits.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Again I have to report a loss on the year's workings. The loss is £105.20.

Subscriptions both Annual and Life are down as are donation and income from meetings.

The magazine printing was up from £148.50 to £155.00.

The Peoples' Bank later known as The Peoples' Trust has closed in Sunderland so our money has been transferred to T.S.B. Special Investment Account.

Peoples' Bank Account was opened in September 1980 with £45.00. In February 1982 £3.00 was added. In March 1986 £73.30 was paid into T.S.B. when Peoples' Trust closed.

#### SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT - September, 1986

The Committee have met 3 times again this year - at the homes of members to whom we are grateful for the hospitality shown and the coffee provided. We have made our usual cash donations of £10 at Christmas; £30 at Easter and £20 or £15 at Harvest time to our remaining 5 recipients.

We are grateful to those who have given so generously when we've had a collecting box at the Winter Re-union and the Dinner. Once again I had the pleasure of taking a small gift of sweets to Mrs. Chapman (Margaret's mother) who was 100 years old in December. In the letter of thanks which we received, via Margaret, we learned that Mrs. Eldridge (our other centenarian) and her daughter Kathleen Mair had also sent a card. It must surely be a unique occasion for 2 centenarians to greet each other like this. Best wishes to you both!

We had a suggestion from the Guild committee meeting that maybe we should think in terms of adopting a charity each year and be seen to be doing good along these lines. It was agreed to ask Elsie Hooker and Elsie Kirkwood - founder members of the Committee what the original aims of the Social Service Committee had been. Elsie Hooker remembered that it was to be person to person contact and the visit being as important as the gift. Elsie Kirkwood wrote at length and here I quote: "Originally the Committee was formed to help school children in need during the years of the depression - the late twenties and early thirties. Quite a number of us who were teaching at the time saw the poverty suffered by the children. In those days there was nothing like the different Government Departments who now help destitute folk. The Committee was formed quite soon after the formation of the Guild of Old Bedians in 1928. We met 2 or 3 times a year. After collecting good second hand clothing and buying new clothing (money for this was raised by having fund raising events - quite big affairs), and these were distributed among teachers who saw that the needy children got a share. During the winter months, we gave, on Saturday afternoons, parties for 50 - 100 children in different parts of the town. In the summer we organised a picnic in Bede School grounds for 100 poor children - it was generally my job to escort the children to Bede in a tram car. They always had a good tea with ice cream etc. and a present to bring home.

When war broke out in 1939, we turned our attention to the armed forces and members did a lot of knitting. After the war we felt that the children were being cared for more adequately but that the old folk were neglected, so our efforts turned towards them". Thank you Elsie for that useful information.

The Committee decided to continue helping our 5 old folk and to reconsider our position when they no longer needed our help.

Thanks are due to the faithful band of Canasta players who provide the bulk of our income and enjoy very pleasant evenings and gorgeous suppers during the winter months. Thanks, too, to all of you who remember our existence and send donations and also to our "adopted" member Gladys Stewart's (Sidney) sister Ethel, who this year presented us with a beautiful cake to raffle.
