Lucy showed me the badge at a reunion and how I envy her possessing such an exquisite copy of our badge - it brought tears to my eyes!

At the time when Bede School - the Girl's School has finally closed and is - at this moment - a mass of scaffolding and rubble - Jean Brown (Pillans) felt impelled to write the following:

Memories of Bede School

Mainly in the beginning — No ties - but blue square necked blouses;
No boys, except next door;
No Male teachers, except next door,
