Late party-givers always do well after a C.O.B. Winter Reunion, getting new ideas for their own late winter parties. This year we had to discover names of football teams missing on a typed story sheet, e.g. "The sun shone" (brightest) the day of ...etc.. This was easy compared with the next game - a kind of multiple choice of "DATES" - squares to tick gave us options of years of specific events, e.g. Virginia Wade winning Wimbledon, Kennedy's assassination, Queen's Silver Wedding etc. Much argument and discussion among the teams, it was difficult - not only "the oldies" among us but comparative youngsters didn't fare too well (if they did - we didn't believe them). SOCIAL SERVICES - September 1993.

Our last meeting was on November 30th 1993 when we gave £20 as a Christmas gift to our two remaining recipients and the three possible ways that the Social Service work could continue were mentioned:-

- 1) To subsidise the magazine printing and postage.
- 2) Christmas boxes of biscuits to 85 year old Old Bedeans.
- 3) To give to local charities.

At this juncture, Mary expressed the desire to resign through difficulty to attend meetings other than in her own home. I, too, expressed similar difficulties, and had no wish to be involved in attending meetings to discuss charities to be helped so it was left to the Canasta crowd to make a final decision - as they provide the bulk of the funds available - approximately £100 per year.

During the year, however, - flowers and/or cards have been sent to sick or grieving Old Bedans and while this is laudable, I feel very strongly that hurt can so easily be felt by those whose predicament never reaches the ears of the Committee. I did have a chat with Elsie Kidwood during the year and she, too, felt this was not a good idea and for the same reason.

I would therefore like to propose that the money should be given annually to the charity chosen by the current Chairman of the Guild. (I understand this is done by other groups) and that way - no one would feel hurt or left out if they were overlooked.

At the Annual Business Meeting held in "school" the majority present agreed with this proposal so, for as long as the Canasta parties continue - money raised will be given to the current Chairman of the Guild to give to her chosen local charity while she is in office.

Mary Addison (Robinson) and I thank the Guild for our unexpected presentations at the dinner - we each received printed newspaper and a plant - and apologise for being "tongue-tied" - or as I rather haphazardly put it: "gob-smacked". A later comment by a "friendly" old Bedan was that neither of us were used for our "lack of words" in the past. Put it down to shock.

This year 20 girls gathered for the annual reunion at the Grange Hotel in Newcastle Road on Friday, 3rd September ("The day war broke out" as the comedian Rob Wilton used to recall - that confirms several!)

Before the evening got under way we all stood for one minute in silent tribute to Pat Morgan (Smith) who died in June. It was Pat who initially floated the idea of a Reunion 50 years after we entered the portals of Bede School as 1st Year Grammar School girls (albeit some of us came via Richmond, N. Yorks, as evacuees, in 1939). Pat had made a conscious decision to live life to the full despite a heart condition which suggested many restrictions on her daily activities. Indeed she was playing tennis the day before she died. Maureen Richardson (Robson) and her husband attended Pat's funeral at the Church of St. Cross in Winchester, which in reality was a Service of Thanksgiving to honour all she had done in the community. Also in the congregation was Pat's cousin Enid Bell who had travelled from America. To all her school chums Pat's memorial will always be the "39ers" annual reunions.

Also included in our silent tribute was Pat Barlow who had been living in New Zealand and word reached us of her passing. It seemed fitting that we should be assembled in the Grange Hotel exactly opposite the house where Pat lived during her time at Bede.

Did you start Bede in 1936? Do you know Margery Edwards (she was clever), Olga Palmer, Edith Gardner or Olive Jeffries ??

This all stems from a "phone call recently from an old Bede boy Dick Oakley,

"You must tell them about Olive Jeffries who is doing such marvellous work in India", says he. A "phone call to Olive in Colchester where she has a flat when not working in India" - Yes, she was born in India, came to England when 2½ years old and started Bede in 1936. She was evacuated to Richmond and then worked at Bridgewater in R.O.F. Laboratories with Edith Gardner but has lost touch with her since then. Subsequently she became a nurse, midwife and health visitor.

During a holiday in South India in 1979 Olive was deeply moved by the poverty and ignorance she witnessed. So - after taking early retirement she went back to Madurai district Tamilnadu to use her experience as a health visitor and fieldwork teacher to implement community health education and self-help development schemes.

Olive had started the Good Foundation Charity aiming for the people themselves to improve their own health and their environment, to root poverty and improve the quality of their own lives.

By 1984 two projects had been set up, one rural and one in the grim area of Madurai city. Services include mother & child health, literacy classes, health education, treatment and home visiting. Six years ago a cottage industry was started to combat malnutrition in babies by allowing mothers to bring their young children to work with them. There is a creche and this also releases an older child to go to school now that he/she is not needed for child minding. In the ground floor clinic there is free treatment, ante and post-natal care. A weekly under-fives clinic is held in the workroom as well as education and health teaching. Uptake of immunisations is high.

It is easy to see that Olive and her helpers have a full time job.

Olive spends some time in England though and still keeps contact with family in the North and visits cousins in both Newcastle and Sunderland regularly.

She would love to meet Margery, Olga, Edith or any girls from that year or around that time and catch up on the news, families and lives. I think she is planning to come North next May. In the meantime she keeps a flat in Colchester.

As Dick Oxley said "Having met Olive and heard her talk you can be very proud of this Old Bedan."

School Uniform

Girls MUST wear a navy blue tunic to within four inches of the knee, a lighter blue blouse with square neck, navy blue knickers, long black stockings, house shoes with low heels for indoor wear, a school cap (price 3/6d) and preferably a navy blue coat. For special functions e.g. Speech Day, a simple all-white frock must be worn.

Girls MAY wear :

1. School Blazer from 17/6d.
2. School Jersey from 10/-.

3. School Scarf 4/- Id.
4. School Tie 2/- Id.
5. Plain straw hat with school hat band.
6. Summer frock of same material as school blouse, with elbow sleeves, plain white collar and cuffs.

An excellent two-course dinner is provided in the School Dining Hall at a cost of 8d.


EDITORIAL COMMENTS.
