I'd like to thank the committee for all their help during the year, especially selling tickets for reunions and encouraging new members to join the Association.

Audrey Hayton (Carrick), our remaining Vice-President, recalls Elsie as a helpful, kindly, very busy person. We are sorry, too, to report the death of Miss Carlin and thank Audrey Hayton for the following :

Miss E. E. Carlin

May of this year brought the sad news of the death at the age of eighty-nine of Miss E.E. Carlin. She was herself a product of 'the Bede'; indeed she was initially a product of the old preparatory department before moving into the main school. After training as a teacher and gaining experience at Redley P.T. Centre and Monkseaton School she eventually returned to Bede.

A prima-donna figure in a stiffly starched white overall, with a squat and attractive (if old fashioned) hair style, little Miss Carlin soon proved her worth as a firm and effective teacher. Her work in the Science Department commanded the respect and affection of her pupils and earned her a place among the dedicated staff stalwarts who contributed so much to the excellent nose and scholarship of Bede Girls' School.

Active and energetic, she was always ready to help in other activities such as the Science Society. Especially notable were her achievements as wardrobe mistress and costumer for many school plays. Those who remembered the famous production of *Dido and Aeneas* which featured in the School's Diamond Jubilee celebrations, always delighted in recalling Miss Carlin's success in clothing the cast in white sheet sheets, skilfully draped and tucked, material ready for the costumes of plays yet to come. In addition producer of many plays found Miss Carlin's eye for colour harmonisation contributed notably to the beauty of the stage presentation.

On retirement Miss Carlin's days were filled with good works. She continued to devote herself to the care of her beloved old mother. A keen member Of the Sanderson Florist Art Club, for many years she organised the purchase and arrangement of flowers for the Fulwell Methodist Church. She was also secretary of the Sisterhood and her talents, whether on spiritual matters or floral arrangements, were much appreciated.

At home she took great pride in her garden where she often entertained small parties of youngsters who were usually most interested in the pool with its frogsprings or tadpoles. In addition, she was always ready to provide coaching for young friends in need of a little help with school work. Furthermore, her Sunday night after chapel 'at homes' gave much pleasure to the young folk who attended them.

Miss Carlin also kept herself occupied with reading? knitting (usually bed-jackets and socks), making her dainty sweet smelling so called lavender 'bottles' or her neat little jars of jam or marmalade. Most of her products found their way to friends or to the organisers of many good causes. Miss Carlin led a full, busy and independent life almost to the very end.

EDYTHE BROWN'S HOUSE

On Tuesday, 31st October 1995 four Mums, Dorrie Robson, Kathleen Miller, Joyce Morrison and Joan Russell met together to attend the unveiling of a commemorative plaque to Edythe Brown. Edythe was a Mum who, after a long stay in hospital, sadly died in January 1993.

In 1976 Edythe became involved with Ingham Hospital Radio and then with the League of Friends for whom she was a hard-working committee member. As a token of appreciation for the hospital care she herself received and also for the work done by the League of Friends Edythe left a legacy of £73,000 to be used to provide for patient care in South Tyneside Hospitals. The legacy was to be entrusted to the League of Friends of South Tyneside Hospitals. They, together with the Trust Board and other Health Service professionals, agreed to establish a development near the Nurses' Home, on the District Hospital site, providing an outreach facility.

In 1991 the League agreed to the building of a house to be name the Edythe Brown House. Meanwhile Edythe's legacy grew to £25,000. To this was added £11,000 from the League, £15,000 from the Diabetic Society and £41,000 from the Trust Board. Finally, on 13th January 1995, Joan Howes, Chairman of the League of Friends of South Tyneside Hospitals, cut the first turf on the site.

The house has an interesting external design with an attractive and welcoming inner layout. The upper floor is mainly for use by the Dietetic Service which offers a wide area of support to a great variety of patients. Other rooms are also available for use by patient support groups such as the Diabetic Society, Coping with Cancer Group, Health

Promotion Service etc. There is also a training room/workshop for computer assisted learning for stroke patients and those with similar disabilities, to help them cope at home. The League provided the computers and Rayollas donated pictures for all the rooms. The House was officially opened on 31st October 1995 by Trust Chairman Dorothy Blenkinsop and League Chairman Joan Horwitz.

The House will be a lasting Memorial to the generosity of Edythe and all those who gave so untiringly of their time and money.

I'm sure many Bedans will appreciate the following from Iris Harvey (Bennett) recently retired as Chairman of the Guild:

I have just completed 2 years as Chairman of the Guild. Despite early trepidation, it proved to be an enjoyable experience and one which I feel privileged to have had. Many thanks to all who supported and guided me during this time.

It was my first opportunity to scrutinise the chain of office in any detail and I was interested to learn from the inscription on the back that the medallion which forms the centrepiece was presented to the Guild in 1928 by Miss Shuster in remembrance of Miss Lily Hutchinson, a former teacher at Bede.

Curious to know about this lady, I borrowed some back numbers of The Bedan and other publications and set to work. I must admit that it made fascinating reading. Did you know that The Bedan was first published in 1898 and that it was in 1905 that Bede Collegiate School was so named, having previously been known as Bede Higher Grade School? However I digress...

I discovered that "Cratch" as Miss Hutchinson was affectionately known, taught at Bede from 1900 - 1938. She seems to have been much loved during this time, as is testified in "Portrait of a School" published in 1938. This nickname, we are told, was very apt for one who was the prop of the School's every enterprise, on whom everyone depended. No Bedan, mistress or headmistress who went to her with problems to solve, from hockey to morals failed to receive her sympathetic hearing and advice.

When she first arrived at Bede, the practice was for one teacher to teach all subjects to one class. When inevitably this system was replaced by specialism, Miss Hutchinson at first taught Mathematics and Music, later turning to English and English Literature. No one could recall her picking and choosing her classes, she took a pride in seeing what she could do with the material she was given, the mark of a true and dedicated professional.

She also did some pioneering work on the school's hockey at the time when girls had to be "transported to Whithorn to play" on a corrugated pitch. The "Singing Club" ceased to exist without the much loved "Cratch". I could go on a lot more about this "special" lady, but I feel that her personality and philosophy are best captured in her own words.

"... the things that really count in one's life are not to be measured by what is commonly known as success - they are the intangible things, the happy memories, the friendships, the shared joys and sorrows, in short, the human contacts that one makes".

I hope that her spirit will live on amongst Old Bedans for ever.
