Her lively mind devised competitions involving the whole school, as with the introduction of the "Miss Bede" contest and the supplying of time for decoration in waste-paper bins; some of these still adorn family homes.

Always cheerful and hospitable, generous with her time and resources, May had many outside interests, such as Guides, the Church and the Burns Club.

One of those talented Scottish-born teachers, who have helped to enhance education in this area, she left Sunderland to live on the Isle of Arran with her doctor husband until his death. She is survived by her two sons and their families with whom she always had a close relationship.
