OBITUARY

A TRIBUTE TO KATHLEEN HUMPHREY (HUDSPETH)

Kay's tragic death, last December (2000), shocked us all, a moment's aberration crossing the road outside her house, brought to a sudden end a very full and interesting life. Her classmates remember her as a brilliant artist, but although she gained a B.A. Hon. Degree in Art, saw painting as a hobby rather than a career, and was really very modest about her talent. She met her future husband Eddie, while they were students at King's College, Newcastle. Eventually they moved to Brampton near Carlisle, where they lived for over 40 years. Here she led a busy life. In addition to looking after their two sons, Bryan and Peter, of whom she was so proud, she worked for a number of years as Private Secretary to a local solicitor, and in her spare time helped with the local scouts, became secretary for the Lancercoast W.I., was a voluntary warden for the Woodlands Trust, where she and Eddie could combine a love of walking with a passion for keeping the countryside free of litter, and served on several committees concerned with swimming.

Indeed swimming became her favourite pastime, and it's comforting to know she was looking forward to a good swim, in the baths in Carlisle, when her sudden end came. It is ironic, that after so many years, I only discovered in 1998, that Kay lived in Brampton. We were so glad to meet up again, and she enjoyed coming with me to the 30er's reunion lunch at the Barnside Hotel, where she renewed many friendships, some going back to her infant school days.

Sadly this happened only twice, but I for one am grateful for the opportunity I had, to spend, all too short a time with Kay.

SHEILA SNOWBALL (RICHARDSON)

MURIEL SLAWTHER (EDWARDS) 17th February 1927-3rd October 2000

Muriel died last year in Vancouver Canada.

She attended Bede from 1948 - 1953 and then trained as S.R.N. at Sunderland Royal Infirmary.

She later travelled Europe for some time; working on Rhine cruises in Germany and spending six months in Morocco. Whilst there she lived in the family "women's quarters" of Ahmed Yacoubi, a leading painter, and some assumed she was lost to the "white slave trade"! Next she immigrated to Canada, working in hospitals from Toronto, westwards to Vancouver, where she eventually settled. There she met Ray Edwards, an English High School teacher. She and Ray were married in Bermuda, where she had earlier worked for a while. In Vancouver she had two children, Claudia and Guy. Sometime later the family moved to New Zealand, to follow Ray's career and settled on the idyllic shores of the Bay of Plenty, North Island. There they had a citrus orchard and some sheep! Muriel became 'truly rural' and learnt to spin dye and weave her own wool. The family later returned to Canada and Vancouver and resettled. Muriel worked in a busy operating theatre at Vancouver Children's Hospital.

Last year Muriel was about to retire and was looking forward to some leisure time, for skiing, sailing, cycling and other hobbies. She was planning to visit Sunderland, when she became very ill, and never recovered.

Many of Muriel's friends and colleagues from Vancouver hospitals celebrated her life in a special church service in October.

She certainly lived life to the full.

K.T.HESLOP

I had the honour and privilege of teaching under the guidance and leadership of Miss Heslop, in the Geography Department of Bede School, in the early days of my teaching. I carefully observed her methods and adopted her approach in several important respects. I owe a tremendous debt to her example and work ethic.

Kate (or K.T.), whichever version you use to refer to the inimitable Kathleen Theresa Heslop, was one of the long serving members of Bede, who dedicated her life to the school. Countless pupils experienced her teaching style and gained from her thoroughness and care. She had the remarkable gift of never forgetting a pupil's name. Years after leaving school, former pupils would be encountered in the street, and greeted with an instant declaration of their name. This revealed a personal touch, which she carefully hid away under her formidable presence, when faced with a class of potential miscreants.

Her teaching style was, simple, honest and forthright. A no nonsense philosophy prevailed and everyone was there for the serious business of working. Basic values were observed, and she insisted upon an orderly class, and a display of good manners. As an organiser and Head of Department she was first class and everyone was well aware of what was expected of them. She set an active example to others and punctuality was her trademark.

She was a kind and caring person who respected others and expected the same in return. She personified the 'Old Fashioned Virtues' that appear to be sadly lacking in a minority of circles in this more liberal age. She was fiercely independent, and managed on her own, in a dignified manner, serving as a good example to others, with the strength of her spirit.

AUDREY HAYTON (CARRICK) was a pupil at Bede Collegiate School for Girls, transferring with it to the New Durham Road site – thus her involvement was of long standing and her loyalties ran deep. She read for her degree at Armstrong College (Newcastle University). Her first teaching post was at West Southwick Secondary School. During the early part of the war, she took a position in Callington, Cornwall, which she found different and enjoyable, but North East ties, thankfully, brought her back to our region. She took a post at Bishop Auckland Grammar School, for a few years, finally settling into her ‘Alma Mater’ – by then, Bede Grammar School. Initially teaching History, she progressed to becoming Deputy Head Teacher, taking over the position from her future sister-in-law, Kathleen Carrick. She then married John Carrick, a Durham University lecturer, in the mid-fifties, and had many happy years with him, until sadly widowed in 1974.

Shortly before she retired, she became acting Head Teacher of Bede. My principal contact with her was during the years of her retirement. She was charming and alert, keeping in touch with former staff friends and ex-pupils, from whom she was always delighted to receive their news and views.

I was indebted to Eileen Brass and Valerie Northorpe for their personal contribution to this eulogy. Eileen (former A level pupil) remembers especially the high standards Mrs. Carrick set for herself, and expected no less from all pupils. This was always tempered with generous assistance to assure that they achieved their aims.

Valerie, also a former pupil, but later a staff colleague (at Bede) quoted her as an inspirational teacher and dedicated historian.

Nothing was left to chance, her preparation being such that she gave out ‘hand outs’, in those pre computer days, when hand outs were hand made! She remembers the impeccable organisational skills, but most of all, the caring interest in each pupil’s welfare.

An accidental fall, caused Audrey to move into a nursing home. The broken bones healed, but the great shock took its toll and her brightness gently faded. She died a very few days before her 84th birthday, in March 2001, having dedicated the major part of her life to her beloved school.

DOROTHY STEPHENSON (THOMPSON)



KATHERINE T. HESLOP was a brilliant teacher of Geography, but she was also the archetypal child psychologist, knowing precisely who to encourage, and who to provoke into producing the level of attainment she expected.

Working without text books (in 1946 only elderly atlases were available) but with her verbal skills and blackboard expertise second to none, she slip-tested, on a weekly basis, until her gems of wisdom were firmly implanted.

I recall two of the many such gems, emerging in later years.

Learning geographical terms' Industrial inertia' came up in 1947. Miss Heslop quoted 'Consett Iron Company' as a perfect example, explaining that of the three ingredients necessary, only limestone flux (the cheapest) was available locally now. The iron ore and coking coal were worked out and had to be transported at vast expense. Thus the company was non-viable and uneconomic, and should be relocated to a port or coalfield. Successive governments failed to acknowledge this, until the surprise closure, some 33 years later in 1980, but our astute Miss Heslop had focused on this need all those years before.

A second gem was incorporated in lessons on Volcanicity. In 1948 she explained the 'Ten Great Plagues of Egypt' in Geographical Scientific terms, stemming from volcanic eruptions. At the head of the Nile - thus the lava coloured river of blood, the sulphurous poisoning of the fish, the frogs leaping out to save themselves, the plague of boils due to drinking the sulphurous water etc. We all said "So it was *not* miracle at all!" "Oh yes it was" she said, "It was the timing that was the miracle, when Moses struck the ground with his rod". A T.V. programme in 2000, discovered similar reasons.

Miss Heslop came to a reunion in 1997, when she was 91, she looked around at all her former pupils from the 45/46 intakes, and turned to me and said "Such delightful ladies, it makes one so proud to have had a hand in producing them, you know?"
The ultimate accolade!

DOROTHY STEPHINSON (THOMPSON)

THE LONDON BRANCH

I am sorry that a report about London Old Bedlars was missing from last year's magazine. My letter to the secretary, asking her to mention that no one was free for the reunion in May 2000, and that I had had a minor stroke in August, never arrived.

Muriel Heron (Woodruff) and I were the only guests at Nancy's lunch in May, (I went by mini-cab as I can no longer drive). We decided that the October reunion would be the last, in view of the difficulties the members have in attending, and I was very disappointed that no one was free to come to me. In 1937? The London Old Bedlar Branch was suggested by Miss Shearer, who asked me to arrange meetings, all that I remember is that on several occasions (annually), about twenty of us met for tea at the Y.M.C.A. (Totterham Court Road) and played silly games afterwards! Does anyone else remember?

The war stopped meetings and it was not until 1952, when Phyllis Beck (Tennant) took over, that a small number, out of about 40 members, started meeting at each other's houses.

On May 1st 1954, Miss Shearer, Miss Ewart and Miss Birchall, joined eight of us for tea, at Lyon's Corner House, and a walk on the Embankment Gardens. Several years later Miss Seddon and Miss Birchall, entertained us at their homes and later Miss Moul was hostess several times. We were pleased to see Miss Ewart and Miss Franklin at several of our reunions.

I relieved Phyllis of her responsibility in 1962, and we continued as before, with two reunions a year and several picnics in St. James's Park with our young children - it never rained! We were all shocked at the sudden death, in 1968 of Phyllis Beck (Tennant) and very sad for her husband and young family.

The number of members gradually declined, but occasionally a "New Old Bedan" joined us for a time, and gave us up to date news of Bede. In 1959 Nancy Laufer (Hubicka) moved from Kensington, where we had visited her, to Ealing, and we started sharing the hostessing some years later, changing from tea to lunch. Nancy and I met every week to play duets and play to Action Blind Clubs, when asked. I apologise for the length of this report, but it is my 'Swan Song' as the London Branch is now closed down. We have made some very good friends and will keep in touch. Apologies for the alterations, right hand (and brains) fail quickly.


GRETA
