


Though often beaten by Pat Swan (Feltoe) and Eileen Scorer, both Old Bedass. We moved to Bede in 1940, and our friendship was cemented during those wartime years. How spartan today's teenagers would have found our lives - no cars, discos or mobile phones, and everything rationed. However we enjoyed life to the full, sharing whatever was available - even boyfriends occasionally!

Jean thoroughly enjoyed her years at Bede, and one of my abiding memories is of Jean, draped in a toga (Sheet!) at a "Saturnalia" singing Miss Orme's Latin version of a popular song. She could still remember all the words and regaled our table at the last Old Bedass Dinner with a rendition of "Amo Pueri" (Miss Orme's translation of "I Love a Lassie")! In 1947 Jean went to Newcastle to study medicine - one of the few female medical students at that time - and had a brilliant career as a Doctor, eventually becoming a strict but much loved G.P. She not only cared for her patients' health, but also shared their troubles and became their friend. Our friendship continued through marriages, births and deaths and we supported each other through life's ups and downs. When I moved to York we visited each other frequently, and kept in touch by extremely long telephone calls. Even after she retired it was difficult to fit in these visits as Jean had so many interests and never seemed to have a free day.

She studied for another degree, which she obtained aged 70; she was a member and a past chairman of Herrington Flower Club, executing some wonderful flower arrangements in Durham Cathedral, at the Gateshead Festival and in St. Nicholas Church. Which she attended regularly. She was a member of the Embroiderers' Guild, producing some beautiful needlework, and also a member of the History Society. As we all know, she was a past Chairman and an energetic supporter of the Guild of Old Bedass.

Jean threw herself wholeheartedly into everything she undertook and never spared herself. She had the same attitude to her illness, when diagnosed with terminal cancer, at the beginning of 2003. She underwent gruelling chemotherapy, in order to be fit enough to attend her son's wedding in June, and just before that had to cope with the sudden death of her Son-in-Law aged 49 years.
