Then a surreptitious trip up the music room stairs—a surprising long flight now. We arrived at the top, breathless, only to be faced by a locked door. No strains of the school song accompanied by Mr Hartley on the piano. Meeting the caretaker on the way down, we knew we had been caught. Were we in trouble? No problem. We guiltily explained we were a couple of old girls doing some exploring, and he smiled.





The first was when I carved my name into my desk with a compass and got double detention, firstly for the crime, and secondly for my response when asked if I would destroy the furniture at home like that. I did not mean to be rude when I said that our dining table was too good for such treatment but my answer was taken for cheek rather than an honest reply.

The second was later on in my school career, I sat on my desk when chatting to Janice Arnold and Brenda Younghusband and started to swing my legs. The next thing I knew, I was on the floor and the top of the desk had become detached from its base. Fortunately, on this occasion, my well-being was of more concern to our teacher than the damaged desk but I was extremely embarrassed - my pride was hurt more than my body!



The benefits of keeping our brains as well as our bodies active as we get older are well known, and those of us living in the North-East are fortunate to have a unique lifelong learning scheme on our doorsteps. The Explore scheme was launched in 2013, following the closure of Sunderland University's award-winning North East Centre for Lifelong Learning. It is now run by a community interest company, the Joseph Cowen Centre, on a not-for-profit basis; membership is open to anyone with an appetite for learning.

We organise a programme of over 450 classes a year over three seasons, encompassing a diverse range of topics including art history, practical art, archaeology, astronomy, classics, literature, history, mathematics, music, philosophy, science and more. No previous knowledge or qualifications are needed – just enthusiasm and an interest in learning new things. Our team of inspiring tutors includes university lecturers, researchers, writers and practising artists. Members pay an annual fee, and may then attend as many sessions as they wish. There's also an informal summer programme of walks, field trips, visits and member-led discussions. Most classes take place on the 4th floor of Commercial Union House, Pilgrim Street, Newcastle, - it's a surprisingly lovely venue and close to Monument Metro and bus links, - classes are timed to enable the use of concessionary travel! We currently have over 200 enrolled members, from across the north-east and as far afield as Cumbria and Teesside. If you think you might be interested, then do have a look at our website where you can find full details. We run occasional 'taster days', or you can drop into a session free of charge to see if it's for you, - just phone or email our office.

#### **Obituaries**

Sheila Moore 1934-39

During the war, Sheila was part of the codecracking team at Bletchley Park "eavesdropping" on top secret German messages. Her family only found out about this decades later.

She was born in 1923 and lived in Bramwell Street, Hendon. She won a full scholarship to the Bede, which was then a private school, but left



when war broke out. After a time as an apprentice tracer, she became unemployed and then joined the Auxillary Territorial Service. She was sent on a 6 month course to learn Morse code



and then posted to Beaumanor Hall where she worked four six-hour shifts in 3 days, listening out for signals sent in Morse Code. After the war she worked for a painting and decorating firm, then Simmon's furniture store and finally the Gas Board. She died in December 2014 at the age of 91.

Kathleen Allen (Brown)

Kathleen passed away in May 2015 at the age of 85. She was a pupil at Bede Collegiate School. She taught at Diamond Hall and Hudson Road schools before working as a home teacher for those who were too sick or ill to attend school.

She devoted her life to helping others. She was secretary of the Roker Methodist Church Women's Fellowship for 50 years and worked on the Red Cross tea bar at Sunderland Royal Hospital for 35 years. She had also been a Victim Support volunteer and ran sequence dance classes with her late husband.

She was diagnosed with Motor Neurone disease last summer and spent the last 2 months of her life In a care home close to her home. She was a long-standing member of the GOB.
